**VETERAN OF THE PATS GOES TO FIGHT AGAIN**

OTTAWA, March 4.—A veteran of the Princess Pats Regiment has joined the 207th Battalion. Private Alfred Harness was one of the few members of that famous regiment who was not wounded, although he was in the trenches with that unit on every occasion from the first time the Canadians were under fire until last August.

He escaped the shells and bullets of the enemy. But the hardships of the trenches impaired his health, and last August he was invalided home to recuperate.

"The Germans must have suffered great losses in that last struggle," he said. "The way they come on in quarter column, if they are caught by the French 75' there is awful havoc. I have seen these French guns working near our flank, and when they catch a force in close formation they work with deadly precision."

**"JACK" FISHER SOON TO BE IN HARNESS AGAIN**

LONDON, March 6.—Admiral Lord Fisher, who since his retirement as first sea lord, has been serving as chairman of the war inventions board, will according to the Daily Chronicle, shortly return to a prominent service, probably as a member of the war council.

Winston Spencer Churchill former first lord of the admiralty and now serving at the front, has returned to London on leave of absence. His object in returning is to deliver a speech in the house of commons next Tuesday, which probably will take the form of a reply to criticisms in the newspapers and in parliament in connection with the naval-air service.

Dr. Ritchie England made an especially strong plea.

"Here, for instance, is Mrs. Langstaff, a brilliant, well-qualified woman," she said, "who has passed her examination, and it is a shame that the door should be shut in her face to prevent her from using the talents she has cultivated."

In turn, the arguments that women's place was at home, that the legal profession would be swamped by women and so on, were dealt with by Dr. Ritchie, England, Madame LaJoie, and Mr. Jacobs, and when the committee voted against the bill these arguments remained unanswered.

FORT WORTH, Tex., March 6.—Conviction of fifteen-year-old Katherine Harrison, charged with the murder of W. L. Warren, the man she says wronged her before her marriage, is impossible under the Texas law, her chief counsel, W. B. Scott of Dallas, declared "this afternoon."

"As we understand it there is no way, under the law of the State, to punish the girl in any manner," Scott declared.

The District Court cannot deal with her because she is a juvenile. The juvenile court cannot deal with her because the law for juveniles applies only to males, and besides, there is no prison for feminine juveniles.
