SENATOR WOOD ON THE MAIL SERVICE

Between Sackville and Cape Tormentine

He Tells Reason Why Special Train is Not Run Thus Delaying our Mails 24 Hours At Present Time.

The question of N. B. & P. E. I. railway carrying the Island mails to and from Cape Tormentine was brought up by Senator Wood at the last meeting of the Sackville Board of Trade and he spoke on the subject at considerable length. He showed how very necessary a special train is for carrying these mails in order that the Island people shall have the best possible satisfaction. When these mails are carried by the regular train 24 hours are lost not only in getting the mails to the Island but also in the delivery of all mail matter from the Island. The question of a special train had often been brought up, but the department never seemed willing to pay the railway a reasonable amount for running such a train.

Mr. Wood stated that a special train ran from Summerside to Cape Traverse and also from Charlottetown to the Cape to connect with the ice boats, and when the steamers were making regular trips to Georgetown a special train met the boat and conveyed the mails and passengers to Charlottetown with as little delay as possible. The government paid \$1 per mile for the running of the trains, and this was the sum asked for a special train on the N. B. & P. E. I. road for performing the same service.

The speaker said he did not consider this out of the way and would be very glad to leave it to any competent railroad man to decide. Mr. Pottinger had stated that \$1 a train mile was not out of the way and Mr. Russell, who was formerly in Moncton had given his opinion that it was altogether too low a rate. The speaker stated that the cost of running a train to Cape Tormentine and return taking one month with another summer and winter was \$40. At this season the cost would be from fifty to 100 per cent greater, so it could easily be figured out how much the railway would make out of running a special for a few weeks in mid winter.

The railway now received \$6 for carrying the Island mails to the Cape and the same for carrying them from the Cape to Sackville. The price was fixed several years ago, and the speaker thought it was very low, the mails to and from the Island having more than doubled during the last few years. He would like to see this route become popular and he would do everything possible to make it so, but they could not run a special train at a loss.
