IN MEMORIAM

SADIE NICHOLSON

The death of Sadie Nicholson of Stanchel on the 9th. of March at the age of 26 years removes a dear life from our midst. Sadie endured her sickness for a year and during that long period was always so sweet and cheerful, always looking at the bright side, never complaining of her sickness, but always had such a loving and bright smile which made it so pleasant for her family and those who visited her. Having contracted pneumonia in Boston four years ago she came to her home accompanied by her sister Margaret who nursed her so tenderly. She made great progress towards recovery when she was stricken down with that sickness which was so fatal two years ago, influenza, and although it weakened her very much still she lingered and hopes were entertained for her recovery until about two weeks before this end came when it could be seen by her family and friends that the end was fast approaching. It was beautiful to listen to her testimony of her trust in her Saviour, who was so kind and loving to her during her years of sickness; of her trust and hope to meet friends, father and brother, who predeceased her and the friends she was leaving behind, if they would only trust in her dear Saviour. Some days before her death she chose the text for her funeral, Romans eight chapter—third verse: For I know that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that shall be revealed in us. Some of her favorite hymns were "The Sands of Time are Sinking, also the 23rd Psalm, and Safe in the Arms of Jesus which were sung at her funeral. The funeral which was held on the 14th. was conducted by her pastor the Rev. John Stirling M. A. who made a splendid sermon for the occasion pointing out the high christian life of the deceased. The remains were laid to rest in the Springton Cemetery.

MRS. (DR.) ALEX ANDERSON

The death of Mrs. (Dr.) Alexander Anderson occurred at 3 o'clock Saturday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. F. C. Kingdon, Halifax.

The Doctor and Mrs. Anderson after disposing of their home in Charlottetown about a year ago took up their residence with their daughter, Mrs. Kingdon. Mrs. Anderson has been enjoying a fair measure of health, and her death will come as a shock to those here who were intimately acquainted with her as well as all who knew her.

The Doctor and Mrs. Anderson came to Prince Edward Island in 1862, and resided permanently in Charlottetown until about a year ago. For the greater part of that period they lived in the old Prince of Wales College, of which the Doctor was the revered principal. In this way all the students who passed through the College during the Doctor's principality became acquainted with Mrs. Anderson. She was a lady of exceptional ability, highly educated and widely read, and she took a deep and active interest in educational matters, and all that made for the advancement and refinement of our people. She was a woman of much force of character, and an unusually interesting conversationalist, and no doubt was of real assistance to the Doctor in elevating the Prince of Wales College to the high and honourable position it occupies amongst the leading educational institutions of Canada.

Mrs. Anderson was richly endowed with those Christian graces which characterized the true woman, the loving wife, the exemplary mother. All will join in expressing sincere sympathy to Doctor Anderson, now far advanced in his journey through life, and the family consisting of one daughter, Mrs. Kingdon, and three sons, Alexander, William and Frederick.

O. T. G. Esmondæ To Face Trial

VANCOUVER, B.C., April 19—The preliminary hearing of the case against O. T. G. Esmondæ, described as Sinn Fein "envoy" to Australia, on a charge of seditious utterances, was concluded today, and he will be committed for trial at the assizes in one week. He will remain at liberty on bail in the meantime.

The prisoner is accused of making anti-British statements at a meeting here, and urging the active spread of the Irish revolution by sympathizers in this city. His counsel endeavored to prove that the statements alleged to have been made were no more than "sympathetic comment on the sufferings of the Irish people." It was also submitted that the meeting was not public and the two newspapermen, who testified for the Crown, had no right there. The private nature of the meeting lessened the importance of Esmondæ's utterances, the defense submitted.

Magistrate Shaw ruled that it was a case for trial by jury.

Esmondæ sailed from this port on the steamship Makura about four months ago for Australia, but was refused admittance to that country, when he refused to take the oath of allegiance. He admitted that he was going there to "take care of Irish interests during the absence of Archbishop Mannix."
