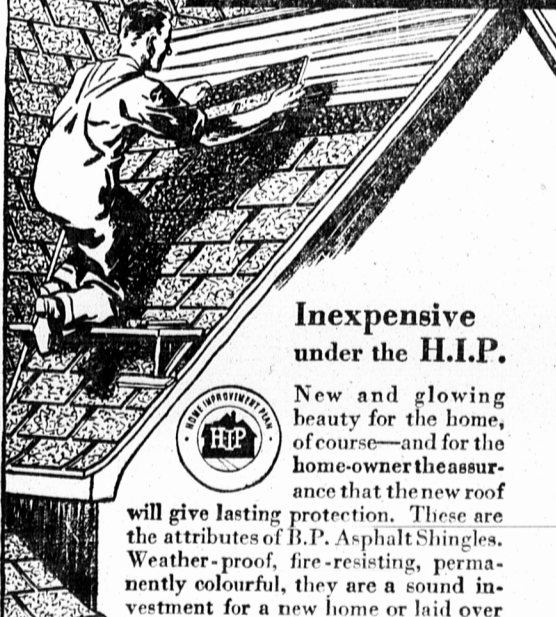

forth more vividly than I can do the tragedy of possessive mother love. I hope that those women who feel that "mother always knows best" and lay its warning to heart. For mother love can curse as well as benefit. It can be a child's greatest blessing or its greatest misfortune.

Dear Miss Dix—I am engaged to a very nice young man, but we are planning to wait another year before marrying, as I have another year in college. I am very much in love with my fiance and anxious to be a perfect wife just for him. Now the question is this: I had intended being a doctor and have nearly completed my pre-medical course. Would you advise me to finish the idea of a career altogether? My fiance wants me to do whatever I wish. He is also going to study medicine when he graduates this year, so maybe one doctor in the family would be enough. Money is no consideration, as we will be able to finance two medical careers, if you think best. A GIRL OF 19.

Not long ago I was at a banquet that was given in honor of several young girls who had just graduated in medicine at a famous school, after having made brilliant records at a famous school. They looked so lovely and so young and girlish and their new title of doctor set, so incongruously on their shining heads that I sighed and smiled as I said to two older women doctors who sat next to me:

"It is all very fine, and it fills me with pride of my sex to see these young girls starting out on their careers as physicians, but I wonder practically how much it is going to pay them, or their families, for the thousands and thousands of dollars the medical training has cost them and for the years of hard work they have put in on it. novels like "Gene with the Wind" is even more interesting to those who have a knowledge of the great English novelists than to those who have not."

In the eighteenth century for the first time in English literature the novel of manners became a most important literary form. Fanny Burney with her "Evelina" (1779) which follows the epistolary style of Richardson, produced an excellent example of the novel of manners, giving the life, atmosphere, costume and spirit of the time—"The great eighteenth century novelists seem to have agreed with Pope's dictum, 'the proper study of mankind is man.'"

From "Marginal Notes" in a recent Toronto Saturday Night—

"The novel, like jazz and the institution of the family, has been reported as being on its last legs for a long time—why contemporary critics expect their age to produce great novels in abundance we don't know, unless because it is their age. . . the sheer egotism of it. . . we are not alarmed by the rarity of great novels, nor by the surfeit of mediocre ones. . . writers have to live and people might just as well read trash as see it on the screen. . . we are convinced there will be great novels again as there have been in the past—a characteristic of greatness, whether it be in literature or statesmanship is its rarity. . . fields must lie fallow if the crops are to be enriched. . . and probably that is what is happening in the field of the novel. . . but the discussion goes on nevertheless. . . the latest contribution to what is Ralph Fox's "The Novel and the People" if you are weary of sweet reasonableness you will delight in this book which is violent and dogmatic and delightfully outrageous

... according to Mr. Fox, the only great novel produced in our century is Samuel Butler's "The Way of all Flesh" . . . all other writers he sweeps into the discard. . . Mr. Fox has the recipe for the great novel, but we doubt if it is possible for any one writer to furnish all the ingredients. . . this book makes ready reading and in spite of its dogmatism and iconoclastic thunder, contains some brilliant criticism. . . it is, alas, often vague as well. . . the author, by the way, died recently in Spain, fighting with fellow English writers in the defense of the Loyalist cause."

Two current exhibitions in New York, one of photographs, the other of maquettes or miniature model rooms, provide a view of the best recent work of interior decorators. Emphasized are the styles of late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries, such as the French Directoire and the English Regency periods. But, apparent, is a decided tendency to treat period motifs in a freer manner, either by combining furniture of different

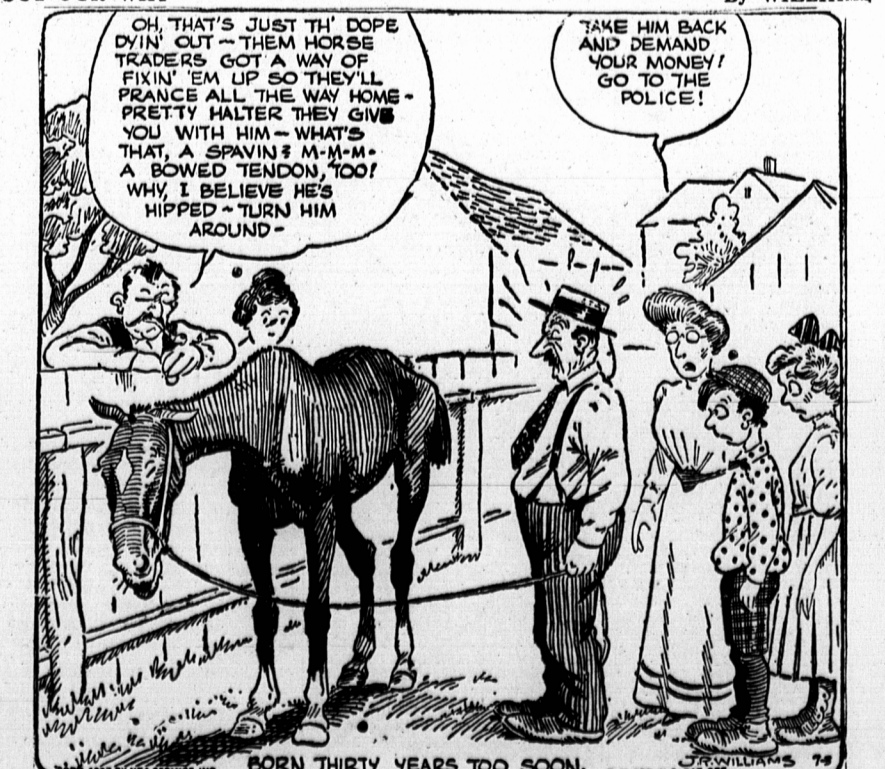
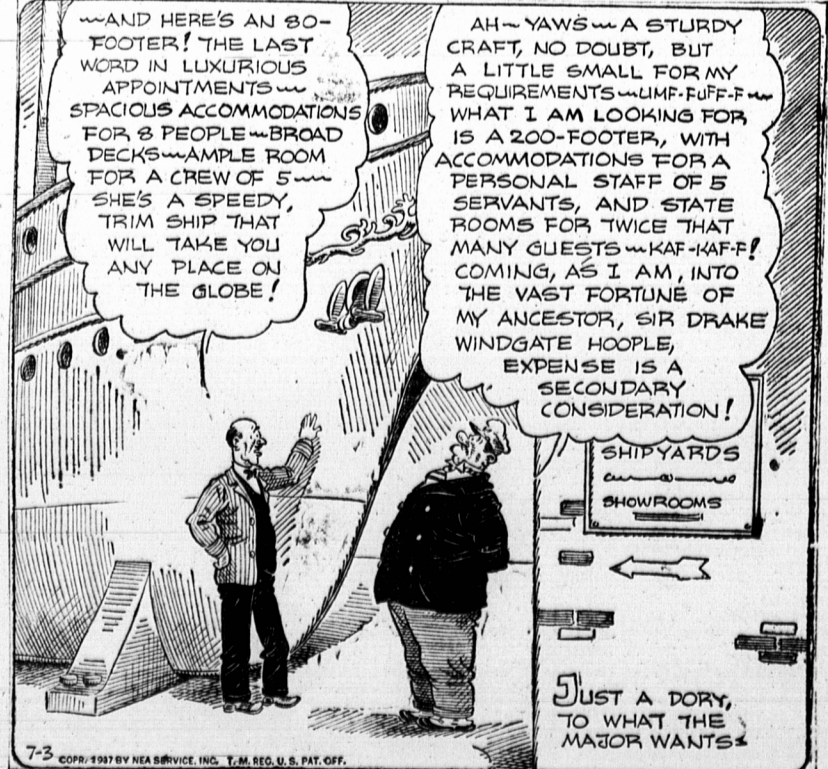

though allied styles or by introducing contemporary pieces.

It is no longer considered odd to furnish a room with antiques or reproductions when its architectural details—fireplace mantle, the trim, or the wall treatment—are modern. And modern furniture is now at home with backgrounds which suggest Colonial days, such as dining room with dados, pilasters or traditional wallpaper.

Today's decorator is introducing original touches that are both consistent and individual.

In 1867, when the composer was forty-one years old, the Blue Danube Waltz, by Johann Strauss the younger, was performed at Vienna for the first time, with Strauss leading. The Danube Waltzes were composed to be sung as well as to be played, and the first performance had a chorus of one hundred and fifty male voices.

Both Brahms and Wagner, famous contemporaries of Strauss, admired him greatly. Brahms, on being asked for an autograph, wrote the first few bars of the Danube Waltz, and then under it, "Alas! Not by Johannes Brahms!"

And Wagner wrote, "One of Strauss' waltzes as far surpasses in charm, finish, and real musical worth, hundreds of his contemporaries as the tower of St. Stephen's surpasses the advertising columns on the Paris boulevards."
