



**"MONTAGUE SALVAGE"**—The Montague P. E. I. Salvage Committee made a very successful start on salvage collecting when they began their first drive on Saturday, May 16. About 1 ton of scrap rubber, 2 tons of paper and tons of scrap metal, besides small lots of copper, aluminum and brass was salvaged. every means to stem our offensive. They sent into action ever greater numbers of tanks. In one comparatively narrow sector, they sent 150 tanks with armored trailers carrying troops in order to break through to one of their surrounded garrisons. "These tanks wedged into our lines but were stopped and about half of them were destroyed. The fascists failed to reach the surrounded garrison. Our units effectively repulsed enemy tank counter-attacks, systematically grinding down the material.

**Series of Tank Attacks**

"One of our guards units beat off a whole series of tank attacks. At first, the Germans sent out 8 tanks followed by infantry. Six of these were destroyed by anti-tank guns and anti-tank rifles. The rest turned back. During the day the fascists counter-attacked 15 times, putting into action more and more tanks each time with the only result that they lost 45 machines without gaining any success. German aviation is very active but is unable to attain superiority. The fascists attempted to land paratrooper detachments. Several instances of landing parachute parties 120, 50 and 30 strong were recorded. Two of these parties were annihilated in the air before they reached ground. Soviet sources said that German reserves recently brought up from western Europe are becoming numerous among Nazi captives.

**POISONING CAUSED DEATH**

SYDNEY, N. S., May 18—(CP)—A coroner's jury tonight found that poisoning caused the death of Mrs. Walter MacDonald, 40, of Clack Bay, whose body was found in nearby Gillis Lake Saturday.

Dr. J. C. Youth testified acid was found in the woman's stomach, and she had not died by drowning. Her husband testified she had been subject to fits of extreme depression.

**CASE DISMISSED** — Two men were dismissed by Magistrate W. E. Darby at an Alberton recently on a charge of stealing a quantity of goods from St. Louis station, when they were required to pay the costs of the C. N. R. prosecution. The men were arrested by Mr. R. O. MacLean of the C. N. R. Investigation Department near Woodville Mills, near Tignish on May 7. The following day they were brought before Magistrate Darby at Summerside, where they were remanded until May 15. Mr. Wilfred Tanton, Alberton, represented the accused and Mr. C. D. **FERTILIZER RUSH** — A line of trucks, stretching for several blocks, waited their turn to get loaded with fertilizer at the Island Fertilizer plant on Bruce Stewart's wharf yesterday. This was one of the three delivery days of the week and farmers and other customers came early and early to get in before the rush. Long before 8 a. m. the line of trucks reached as far up as St. Dunstan's Basilica. About two hours later more trucks had arrived and the last one could get nearer to the wharf than Richmond Street. Workers at the plant kept the supply flowing continuously to the waiting vehicles with the result that the long line slowly diminished until finally the last customer had been served.

**LOBSTER FISHING GOOD** — More lobsters and better prices, is the cheerful news from the lobstermen in the province, it was learned last night from Mr. J. J. Larabee, Supervisor of Fisheries. The catch with a fortnight of lobstering completed, is considerably better than it was for the first two weeks fishing last year. The last catch was 100 tons and the last one could get a pound, or 23¢ a case, this season. \$18 per ton is an advance over the last year. There appears to be a greater demand for the shell fish this season which accounts for the increased prices. Through reports are that the fishing is good in most every section, it is believed that the greatest improvement is in the Alberton section. There are fewer fishermen operating in the province this year but the decrease in numbers is not as great as it was a year ago. Mr. Larabee said the decrease would be a great deal under 25 per cent this year. The lobster season will close on June 30.

**PARADE HELD** — The navy and the army combined in a route march through city streets last night, attracting a great deal of attention as they went by. The ship's company of the H. M. C. S. "Queen Charlotte" consisted of approximately 80 men in charge of Lieut. R. McCarville. The army was represented by approximately 200 men from the 17th Reserve Armoured Regiment, P. E. I. Light Horse, in charge of Major F. W. Hyndman. Two bands, the recently formed naval band under direction of Stoker J. Milne and the Reserve Army band under direction of Sgt. Thomas McFarlane, accompanied the parade and played lively marching tunes along the route. The navy marched from the ship down Kent Street to the Arm-uriers where they were joined by the soldiers. As the parade went past the war monument on Gratton Street the "Eves Right" was given. The boys in blue and khaki presented a fine appearance as they marched along.

**Malta Subject Of Timely Talk By R.A.F. Officer**

"Malta and the Maltese People" was the subject of an interesting address by a Royal Air Force officer, Squadron Leader John Portlock, R. A. F., who read of the courage and endurance of the Maltese people who have lived in this little Mediterranean island. "During the few minutes which I have at my disposal, I would like to give you a picture, as accurately as I can, of the Maltese and their home, based on a two-year stay, which I made four years ago.

"At the time of the victories of the armies of Christendom in the Holy Land, a body of knights were formed who were responsible for the safeguarding of the Holy Sepulchre from the Saracens. When the Christian armies were driven out of Palestine, the Knights of St. John, of Jerusalem as they were called, took refuge on the island of Rhodes, where they remained for many years. They were not to remain there though; they were once more driven out by the Turks, who sought refuge in Malta, which was given to them by the King of Sicily.

**Medieval Pageantry**

"Here in Malta they flourished, and kept alive the vanishing glories of medieval pageantry under successive Grand Masters. They built noble buildings and churches, and filled the island with priceless treasures of art. Even to this day, their armories, filled with old suits of armor, and medieval weapons of war, are among the finest in Europe.

"Under the leadership of the most celebrated Grand Master of all, Malta resisted for two years a siege laid upon the island by the Turks, in just the same magnificent way as it is doing now. Eventually the Turks sailed away, and left Malta unconquered—just as Malta will emerge battered but still unconquered, when this war is over.

"At the time of the Battle of Trafalgar, the island was conquered by Napoleon Bonaparte for a very short while, and the Maltese voluntarily put themselves under the protection of the British Crown. It is cause for much pride by the Maltese that they entered the British Commonwealth of their own free will.

"After the Napoleonic wars, the island settled down as a crown colony, under a Lieutenant Governor appointed by the King.

"It soon became apparent that Malta held a very important position in our communication with India, and the East; especially after the Suez Canal was opened; and as a naval base Malta was soon prominent.

"At the present time it is no less important, as an air base—a veritable thorn in the side of Mussolini's convoys to and from North Africa. It is a prize that he is willing to pay dearly to win; but though the cost has indeed been heavy, to the Axis, the Union Jack still flies over that tiny strip of British soil; nearly a hundred miles from Gibraltar to the West, and Fort Said to the East.

Mr. William R. Connolly, who has accepted the position of overseas secretary of the Knights of Columbus War Services was tendered a farewell party last night by the committee of the local council. The enjoyable function was held at the V Club. About 20 men and their wives were present.

Mr. Connolly was presented a silver identification disc and a prize he won at bowling during the year. The disc was presented by lecturer John B. Richards, while the bowling award was presented by Mr. Raymond MacDonald. Mr. Connolly replied fittingly. Before the party ended he was tendered the best wishes of everyone present.

**SOVIET ENVOY TO JAPAN**

**MOSCOW, May 18** — (A.P.) — A Malik has been appointed Russian Ambassador to Japan to succeed Constantine Sretanin who returned to Moscow three months ago. It was announced tonight, when Smetanin left Tokyo, his visit to Moscow was described as a routine, and it was said would be returned to his post; instead the announcement said, he has received another appointment.
