Above is the naval architect's drawing of the 5000-ton steamship which will be built for the Pacific Coast and Alaska service of the Canadian National Pacific Coast Steamships by the Burrard Dry Dock Co. Ltd. of Vancouver. The ship, the largest passenger vessel ever to be built on the Pacific Coast, will cost about \$3,000,000 and should enter service in 1948. Plans of Molaren and Son, consulting engineers and naval architects, call for a vessel with an overall length of 360 feet, a breadth of 53 feet, a displacement tonnage of 5,000 tons and a speed of 18 knots. The ship will have accommodations for 222 passengers, 11 in outside cabins, and 50,000 cubic feet of cargo space, of which 5,000 will be refrigerated. Besides giving important passenger and cargo service, all year round to Vancouver, Powell River, Ocean Falls and Prince Rupert, the steamship will provide Alaska cruises for hundreds of summer tourists. The crew will consist of 20 officers and 112 men.

Laundry Work Being Done In Summerside

Essential laundry work for public institutions in Charlottetown such as hospitals and hotels is being done at the White Star Laundry, Summerside, in cooperation with Sterns Ltd. Only for this arrangement these institutions would be placed in a serious position as a result of the fire which destroyed the Sterns Laundry last week. Every afternoon two or three trucks bring the linens, etc. to Summerside and after the local plant has completed the day's washing, they wash the material from Charlottetown. Later it is finished by members of Sterns staff, using the White Star laundry equipment. The White Star Laundry is under the supervision of Mr. Gus McDonald, manager of the Sterns Plant, and comes to Summerside every day and their work is completed about ten o'clock at night. The White Star Laundry is doing some private washing for Charlottetown residents who send their work up by express or by bus. As they served two large airports during the war, they have a large capacity and are anxious to cooperate in any way.

Weekly Livestock Market

CATTLE - PRICE SUMMARY - Cattle price trends showed variation during the week. Toronto advanced 1c to 25c for the light offering of killing cattle but dropped 25c on stockers, while Montreal and all western markets declined 50c to 50c. Some buyers were maintaining that prices were out of line with beef prices but others felt they were changed; hogs closed 25c down at Toronto and as much as \$1.00 lower at Montreal; and sheep and lambs were generally 25c to 50c lower. Deliveries of cattle to stock yards and packing plants for the week at 45,700, with only slightly below the same week last year. Total marketings since January 1st are 1,219,300 as against 1,267,300 in the same period last year. Calf marketings to date this year are 608,000 compared with 645,000 a year ago. Sheep and lamb sales for the year to date total 634,000 and last year were 579,400. Hog gradings for the week ended Sept. 21st totalled 42,400 as against 76,002 in the week last year. Gradings since January 1st amount to 3,125,979 and in the same period last year were 4,295,117.

REUSE TO WOOL TO SPAIN

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Sept. 30. (CP) - The Auckland Trades Council has declared "Black" a consignment of wool which was to have been loaded into the British ship Samlyth for shipment to Spain. The embargo has been supported by the Auckland Waterside Workers' Union. A recommendation was passed by the Trades Council urging that unions throughout New Zealand refuse to handle produce for Spain. In 1937 we levied ourselves a dollar a head to fight Franco, said T. Hill, secretary of the New Zealand Waterside Workers' Union. "Today we still don't like Franco, Spain and we don't think there are many New Zealanders who do. The New Zealand Labor government was acclaimed at Geneva for its refusal to recognize the Franco regime and it remains one of the few governments which has not recognized Franco."

SPECIAL UNIFORM FOR MINESWEEPERS

LONDON, Oct. 4. (CP) - The German minesweeping formation which has operated in Kiel Bay, the Baltic and the North Sea coast, has received a new uniform. The uniform consists of a blue tunic and trousers, resembling battle dress, with black buttons. Since May, 1945, the minesweepers have been clearing the waters of Allied minesweepers; which, in the Kiel area of the German coast alone, totalled 3,000 charges of 25 varieties.

MUCH INTEREST SHOWN IN FORTHCOMING SECOND MARITIME AIR MEET

MONCTON, Oct. 1 - Widespread interest is indicated in the second Maritime Air Conference to be held in Charlottetown, October 23 and 24. Rand H. Matheson, manager of the Maritime Transportation Commission, which is sponsoring the conference, stated yesterday. The conference is being held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade. Commenting on the increased interest apparent in the conference, Mr. Matheson said that "rapid strides made in aviation during recent years, the growth of this form of transport and the possible influence of air transportation in the immediate future makes it important for communities to keep abreast of developments." The air conference, he pointed out, affords an opportunity to business men in the Maritimes to obtain first-hand information direct from authorities in the industry. The securing and maintaining of the leadership in the field of air transport could easily be lost to the Maritimes if the necessary enthusiasm of the general public is lost, Mr. Matheson added.

Unchanged Calf Market

Calf prices remained at the previous level. Toronto stockers cleared a light run at \$15 to \$16 for best veals, while Montreal paid up to \$15.50 and \$16. Winnipeg paid \$12.50 to \$13.50 and \$12.50. Edmonton \$12 to \$13; Moose \$12.50; Sackatoon \$13 to \$14; Regina \$12.50 to \$13; and Vancouver up to \$13.25. In the Maritimes top veals were quoted at \$12 delivered.

Rebuffed In Efforts To Quit Cells

(By Tom Reedy) - (AP) - Three top Nazis acquitted of war crimes were rebuffed today in their efforts to quit their jail cells and win safe escort to homes where they could live without fear of the actions of their countrymen. Whether they live in their zone, the former German Ambassador has several residences in the British zones as well as his property in the French zone. Whether von Pappen will apply for residence in the British zone was not learned. Earlier efforts to quit their jail cells were given safe escort to homes they would be given safe conduct to the community involved and German police would be instructed to protect them against violence. But army headquarters pointed out that it remained for the German courts to decide whether any of the three men could be tied for crimes within Germany. It was hardly conceivable that the three would try to gain entrance to the Soviet zone, where comment in the Russian-controlled press over their acquittal was exceedingly bitter. Meanwhile appeals for commutations of death sentences have been filed by defence attorneys.
