### Legion Makes Plea For Total Conscription

Ottawa, June 9.—(CP)—A plea for immediate steps looking to conscripting total manpower wealth and industry in Canada for war purposes, has been given the government by the Dominion Executive Council of the Canadian Legion, it was announced tonight by Alex. Walker, Legion president.

Mr. Walker said he had held separate conferences with Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Defence Minister Rogers, Air Minister Power and Justice Minister Lapointe during which he presented numerous resolutions passed at the recent Dominion convention of the Legion in Montreal.

"Demands for national mobilization reaffirm the principles of resolutions passed at the recent Dominion convention in 1932, 1934 and 1938," said Mr. Walker.

The Legion council also recommended that the Dominion government should immediately assume responsibility for all protective duties throughout Canada at points subject to sabotage by enemy agents.

Suspension of all grants of naturalization during the war and immediate revoking of naturalization of those persons suspected of subversive activities also was recommended. Another suggestion was that a national information and intelligence bureau be set up with branches in appropriate centres in each province where information regarding suspected enemy movements could be placed.

Defence Minister Rogers was urged to use the national veterans' situation, made by the Legion in 1939, in recruiting the veterans' home guard. This survey included the names of 400,000 veterans of the first Great War who had volunteered to serve in any capacity.

### 40 Divisions In Mass Attack

Forty divisions were said to be continuing the mass attack south of the Somme river front. One wing of this offensive had veered toward Novon and Montdidier, south and southwest of Ham.

French reports on the battle south of Amiens said that in the opening days of the battle on that part of the Somme River front the Germans had suffered such severe losses that they had to withdraw the remnants of seven full divisions.

The French said that these divisions—105,000 men at full strength—virtually were cut to pieces.

Determined to force through their offensive, they said, Hitler threw 20 new divisions into the area, giving him a total of 40 on that front alone.

Conflicting reports between Aumale and just below Ham, the Germans driven behind a shield of tanks and warplanes to the Breteuil area in the centre, straightening their line at further heavy cost.

The Germans also poured 10 fresh divisions into the Soissons sector where they succeeded Saturday in crossing to the south bank of the Aisne River on both sides of the town, he said.

### German Airdromes Raided

German airdromes at Abbeville and at Eindhoven, the Netherlands, were bombed Saturday night by heavy bombers which were credited with a direct hit on the main railway bridge and apparent hit on an ammunition store.

A later bulletin said that from tonight until shortly before dawn today the R.A.F. raided military objectives in Germany and Northern France.

In Germany marshalling yards near Essen, Duren and Euskirchen were raided and fires were reported. A German second lieutenant taken prisoner when a Heinkel plane crashed in an east Suffolk garden early yesterday died today in a hospital.

In an attack on St. Valery, eight miles west of Abbeville, the announcement said that "a railway and road bridge over the Somme estuary was repeatedly hit" and the northern span collapsed.

### Use Parachute Flares

Supply columns were located by parachute flares and woods where troops sought cover were bombed.

"A Valenciennes air raid storage plant, bombed by the light of a parachute flare, exploded in a vast sheet of flame, which shot up to a height of 500 feet and was visible 50 miles away. Within a few minutes the area was covered by a vast mushroom-shaped pall of black smoke which towered 7,000 feet into the air."

The centre span of a railway bridge at Vise, 15 miles west of Aachen, was demolished.

Another British plane out of bombs, attacked a large convoy of German vehicles near Wavre, south-east of Brussels.

We used first the front guns and then the rest," the British pilot said. "We made about six separate runs. Each time we flew over the convoys chaos increased. In frantic efforts to get away vehicles began to pile up on each other, blocking the road and holding up the entire convoy."

### Prayer Service At United Church Meeting

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 9 (CP)—A special prayer meeting was held Saturday night by the Maritime Conference of the United Church. More than 800 people joined in prayer for the Allies and their cause.

The first business of the conference today was election of Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, Shediac, N. B., and Rev. G. A. Christie, Miscouche, P. E. I., as commissioners to the general council of the United Church meeting at Winnipeg next September.

Reporting on foreign missions, Rev. G. D. MacLeod, Bridgeport, N. S., stated that United Church missionaries in China have escaped injury during the war although their work has been disrupted and their property destroyed. Dr. J. H. Arnpur reported the missionary staff has had to be reduced by one-third in recent years.

A service was held tonight in recognition of the 15th anniversary of the union of the three churches comprising the United Church. Rev. Gerald Rogers, Wolfville, N. S., was the special speaker.

The church had failed in allowing an imperfect economic system to push aside Christian ethics, said Mr. Rogers adding: "The church lacks Christ consciousness in many cases."
