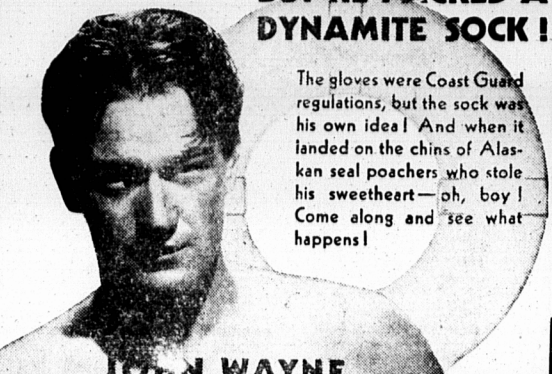

C.N.R. Express Paves Way For Santa Claus

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 15 — In preparation for the busiest season of the year when Santa Claus needs all the assistance he can get for the speedy delivery of his parcels at Christmas time, reduced rates are offered on express parcels weighing up to 15 pounds, according to G. E. Bellerose, general manager of the express department, Canadian National Railways. From a very low minimum charge on a parcel to any express point in the nine provinces throughout the Dominion, the charges vary according to the weight of the package and the distance over which it is to be handled including pickup and delivery service at all points where such facilities are maintained by the express company. Without the express company Santa Claus would find it impossible to visit the millions of homes along the 3,700 odd miles of main line over the Canadian National Railways right-of-way between Halifax and Vancouver, to say nothing of the vast multitude of homes which lie along the network of branch lines of the Canadian National system, and every one of these homes must have their due share of attention from Santa Claus before Christmas has become satisfactory to all of them. "As the Christmas period approaches, the traffic of the Canadian National express shows a gradual increase," stated Mr. Bellerose. "This particular seasonal movement creates one of the most difficult situations our department has to deal with but we all derive great pleasure in handling the Christmas movement because of the very large volume of packages to be picked up, moved and delivered within a comparatively short period, but with additional staff and vehicles at terminals and in the vehicle service we are quite prepared to expeditiously handle all traffic offering. Little Princesses Cry When Told Uncle David is Going Away

LONDON, Dec. 15—Two little fair-haired Princesses, daughters of King George VI, wept today when they were told their "Uncle David" was going away on a long trip. Queen Mary, it was understood, was the main figure in this little drama of anguish, played in a nursery with flowers in the street outside read and talked of the various drama of Empire. The three-year-old Elizabeth—who may one day occupy the throne herself—and her younger sister, Margaret Rose, were standing side by side with their noses pressed eagerly against a foggy window-pane when their grandmother entered the nursery to break the news. The touching interview's details were not disclosed, but it was understood the Royal family agreed the Queen Mother was most suited to tell the little Princesses in words they could understand that their father was the new King and that their "Uncle David" was going away. The two children, particularly Elizabeth, knew "something was happening" but they still watched with puzzled eyes the crowd that had gathered Queen Mary, as she entered the Boccadilly residence of their father.
