Rumania Will Pay Her Debt To Dominion

LONDON, Aug. 6.—A satisfactory arrangement has been made with Rumania by the Canadian government and which will enable Rumania to pay off the principal and interest of the twenty odd millions of dollars which she owes to Canada. The Rumanian government has for a long time been unable to meet even the interest due on the bonds and which covered the trade credit that Canada granted to the kingdom in 1919. The new arrangement will extend the time for payment of the principal of the debt which would have terminated in 1924, for forty years with interest at four percent, for the period of extension instead of five and one half percent as under the original agreement.

The satisfactory agreement of the new arrangement, from the viewpoint of Canada, is that the Rumanian government has earmarked its export taxes as security for both the principal and the interest of the debt. The present bonds will be exchanged for 40 per cent bonds, one 35th part of which will be retired annually after the first five years of the extended time. The interest over due at five and half percent and in the present bonds will be added and compounded at six percent. There has never been much doubt as to Rumania's ability to meet her obligations to the Dominion, as it is one of the finest agricultural countries in the world but its recovery from the effects of the war, in which she was over-run by enemy forces and large

THE SHANTUNG VICTORY

The unconditional surrender of Shantung to China by Japan, of which satisfactory assurance has been given is one of the first fruits of the Washington conference. The Chinese province of Shantung, so long a source of bitterness and hate between Japan and China, might easily have become the cause of another great war. It was rife with all the seeds which bloomed to such evil portent in Europe and were really responsible for the tragedy of 1914. It was one of the matters which statesmen foresaw as creating a possible hideous debacle in the Pacific in which most of the great powers were bound to become involved. Bitter wars have been fought in the past for far lesser international disputes than that of Shantung. The Versailles treaty was unhappy in this respect in greater uncertainty, reeking of injustice to China, and fostering all the elements that go to make and incite wars in nations. But by diplomacy and conciliation Japan has, perhaps reluctantly, made all the necessary concessions and China is to receive back her lost province unconditionally. And at the same time through the same good offices, a friendly understanding is being established between China and Japan that has not existed for over fifty years. It is somewhat remarkable that two pagan powers should be the first to give tangible expression to the spirit of the Washington conference. These oriental powers are declaring to the world that it is not necessary to go to war for the settlement of a vanquished Japan and China have found a better way.

WHAT OUR FIRE LOSSES COST US

According to a recent publication called "Control" published by the department of insurance at Ottawa, which has been forced to take notice of the rapidly increasing waste in Canada and has become impressed with the necessity of calling public attention to the seriousness of this waste, the fire loss in Canada during the year 1921 amounted to more than \$45,000,000 and exceeded that of any previous year in the history of the country. Returns for the present year so far indicate that conditions are going from bad to worse. During the first four months of 1922 losses have amounted to almost \$5,000,000 per month. But the net value of the property destroyed is only a portion—sometimes the smallest portion—of the loss by fire. There must also be taken into account cost of cleaning up the debris preparatory to rebuilding; the loss in productive work while rebuilding or seeking a new location; the profits lost on work arrested by the fire; the costly disorganization of business; the loss of employment suffered through employees; the higher prices caused by the decreased production etc. There is a popular notion that many fire losses are completely covered by insurance, but who pays the losses of fire insurance companies? Ultimately all insurance losses are borne in one form or another by the taxpayer. It is estimated that directly or indirectly, without taking into account the loss of life and injuries resulting in Canada, fire in 1921 totalled the enormous sum of \$38,435,470. And this great sum of almost one hundred million dollars is paid directly by property owners, but subsequently, through the channels of business, every individual in Canada bears his and her share of the burden. So distributed it amounts to \$11.25 per capita of the population and constitutes a tax of more than \$50 per annum upon the average family. It must also be borne in mind that while other taxes produce something in the way of service or benefits, this fire tax of one dollar per week per family yields no returns.

THE NEW GERMAN PERIL

That a new German peril exists there can be no doubt; but it is altogether different one from that which threatened Europe before the war. Today the German peril is not the danger of Monarchist rising, or the return of the old military party to power, (there is ample evidence that such a hope is cherished by a considerable section of the people, and the recent assassination of foreign minister Rathenau and the attempted murder of Maximilian Harden, chief of former kaiser Wilhelm during the war, were the work of Monarchist plotters, but there is little prospect however of the success of a movement to bring back the Hohenzollerns. The real peril lies in the direction of Bolshevism and anarchy following the collapse of the German republic, due to its financial condition. Before the war the German mark was worth 24 cents. At the time of the armistice you could buy seven for a dollar; and when the Peace of Versailles was signed three years ago a dollar bought 12-12 marks; two years ago, 35; one year ago, 600. Unless immediate measures are taken to improve the situation the republic may fall and the nation be plunged into internal strife. Already Zwicken, which is the centre of the textile industry, has set up a soviet republic and the spread of Bolshevism would be a greater peril to France and the rest of Europe than a German monarchy. One of the proposals to avert this peril is a moratorium on reparations payments for a number of years to permit the nation to get back to a firm financial footing. It may be a hardship for France to wait for the money she so much needs to repair the ravages of her enemies upon her territory; but if this is a choice between two evils it would certainly be in her interests to choose it rather than a still greater calamity.

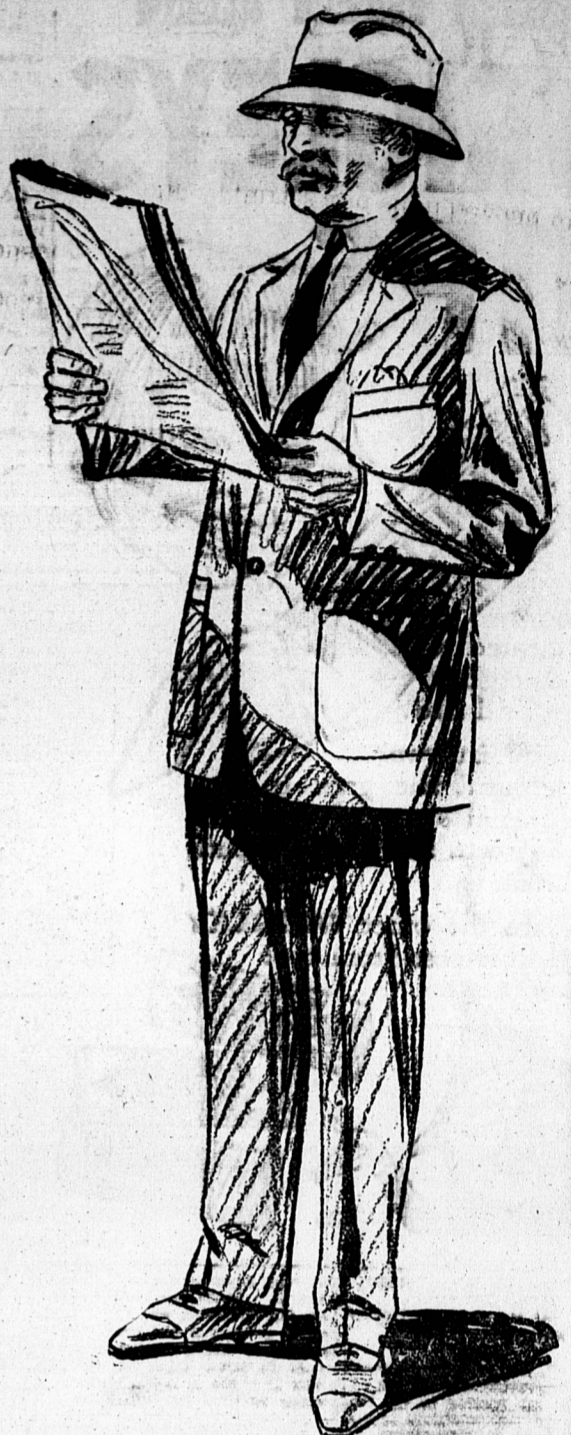

Germans Enter Oporto Market

ST. JOHN, Nfld., Aug. 6.—A Norwegian report from the Legation at Lisbon points out that besides the old competition of Newfoundland on the Portuguese market, there is a growing competition with split fish from Iceland, France and Germany.

At present the German exporters are extremely active in trying to get a firm footing particularly on the great Iporto market with their articles such as artificially dried fish and with the view of accomplishing this are fully prepared to undersell competition of all kinds.

They are accordingly sending larger and larger supplies to Iporto where so far the fish find a ready sale on arrival.

Right here it may be mentioned that the German travelers for some time now have been landing great quantities of Icelandic fish at their home ports and that after meeting the demands of the home market for the fresh fish business, large quantities have found their way to the drying factories at Geestemunde and Cuxhaven.
