To Rev. G. Campbell is Called To Queen Square, St John.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 11.—(Special)—At a meeting of the Quarterly Board of Queen Square Methodist Church on Tuesday evening it was unanimously decided to extend a call to Rev. H. D. Marr, B. A. to become pastor of the church in June next in succession to Rev. G. M. Campbell.

GEORGE FOWLER STILL ABSENT

TORONTO, Oct. 10.—(Special)—Geo. W. Fowler M. P. was still absent when the insurance investigation was resumed this morning but Mr. Shepley stated to the Commission that he had received a telegram purporting to come from Fowler at Winnipeg, saying he would be in Toronto next Friday morning. Mr. Foster continued his evidence about the purchase in June, 1903 by the Union Trust Co for themselves of 46,000 acres of western railway lands upon which options were held by certain Winnipeg men. For 900 acres \$5.75 an acre was paid to John Aird, bank manager at Winnipeg who held the lands in trust and the balance of 36,400 acres were purchased for \$4.00 from the holders of the options.

LONDON BRIBERY INVESTIGATION

Leader of the Gang and Others Examined About Their Methods

TORONTO, Oct. 11.—(Special)—J. C. Pritchett, leader of the gang who made the famous affidavits in the West Elgin election scandals and who has always been regarded as leader of the gang which operated in various ridings during election contests in late years, was the star witness at the London bribery investigation this morning. He said that the headquarters of the election manipulators had been Toronto where plots to steal elections were for the most part hatched. Most of the money handled by the machine and "Dominion" money which was received by manager McDonald was finally paid to voters by Tom Lewis. There were two favorite methods, namely, purchasing votes and switching ballots. The election workers usually invaded a constituency ten days before election and spent the time selecting men to pay out the money, or do what they were told. Later, Pritchett said he received \$40 at one time from W. T. R. Preston. He paid \$5 per vote to a deputy returning officer per ballot switched. Walter Scott was on the stand this afternoon as to bank draft by which it is supposed the crown want to prove the sending of money into London. Scott denied all knowledge of any wrong doing. Six or eight witnesses testified to receiving money for their votes, mostly from Collins. Pritchett told the court he learned the trick of switching ballots in the United States, several years ago.

FURTHER PARTICULARS OF THE SUMMERSIDE FIRE

List of the Buildings Destroyed—A Strong Opinion That The Fire Was the Work of an Incendiary—The Estimated Amount of Loss—One Hundred and Fifty-Five Buildings Gone.

The fire briefly reported in yesterday's Guardian while in progress by long odds the severest calamity that has ever fallen upon Summerside. Starting at the railway freight shed near the east end of the Town it caught on Water Street and cut a swarth clear through the Town to the extreme west end. It is quite possible, as is suspected, that the fire was of incendiary origin and the fact that an incipient blaze was discovered in the same building two nights previous increases the suspicion. But whatever the origin was, an investigation should be held at once and a meeting of citizens called with a view to remedying glaring defects in the civic management. This course will tend to reassure not only citizens, but the heads of insurance companies who have kept a rather suspicious eye upon Summerside and quite frequently emphasized their doubts by a perceptible raise in rates. The burned district includes 155 buildings totally destroyed and a number badly scorched. Some of which are more or less damaged. The loss is estimated at \$225,000 with about \$90,000 insurance. Among the buildings burned are: John Dickieson, warehouse \$1,500; Charles Hotel \$2,000; Strathcona hotel \$5,000; Gladia hotel \$2,000; Mont Waugh, house \$1,000; Alex Waugh, house \$1,000; Thomas Glover, two houses \$2,000; Electric Light Station \$30,000.

Those who went out had a good opportunity to see what was displayed, and there were many who found, notwithstanding the rain, the horse ring to be a most interesting place. The 3,000 horses presented a fine sight and an interested crowd attended the judging of the different classes. Good progress was made by the judges in awarding prizes and very little more in 4,000 that line is to be done. The list of prize winners is here continued from yesterday.

SUPREME COURT DISQUALIFIES

Daniel Gallery, M. P. for St Anne's—Judgment Written by Sir Louis Davies

OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—(Special)—The Supreme Court this morning disqualified Daniel Gallery member of Parliament for St. Ann's Division for seven years for corrupt practices in the last general election. The Supreme Court did not merely sustain the decision of lower courts, but improved upon it. The trial judges in their finding did not specifically declare Mr. Gallery disqualified. The Supreme Court decision noticed this omission and supplied it. The judgement was written by Sir Louis Davies and concurred in unanimously by the other Judges.

WILL CHANGE ALL THE PLANS

FREDERICTON, Oct. 11.—On the death of Archbishop Bond being mentioned to Bishop Kingston this morning His Lordship stated that the occurrence would upset the arrangements for the consecration of the Bishop Coadjutor of New Brunswick. It was said to be the intention of the church authorities to have the Coadjutor consecrated at Montreal, but the Archbishop's death will, of course, necessitate a change. Bishop Sweetman of Toronto will succeed to the position of metropolitan and the Coadjutor will either be consecrated at Toronto or the Archbishop will issue a mandate to a Bishop of the church and have the ceremony take place at the cathedral in this city.

THE PREMIERS CONFERENCE

Work Going on Well But Not Done—May Last Till Next Week

OTTAWA, Oct. 11.—(Special)—The provincial and federal ministers spent nearly all day in Conference and who adjourned this afternoon for lunch the Prime Minister said there was no announcement to make. It is understood that the Conference is progressing favorably and that while no conclusions have been come to but formal ones by the provinces that they need more money, there has been a spirit of give and take exhibited by the various delegates which indicates that the Conference will have a successful termination. But the arrangement of the special conditions demanded by the various Provinces will take time, and possibly the Premier may not get away this week. They meet again tomorrow at ten. LATER. It is understood that all the Premier with the exception of McBride have finally agreed to drop special demands and combine on a general demand for per capita increase. British Columbia still holds out for special principles, but will probably fall in line.
