The steamer *Dacabo* has arrived at Georgetown from Port Morien, C. B., with 900 tons of coal for the rail way.

The schooner *Jubilee* is in Georgetown en route to Campbellton, N. B., with coal, loaded at Port Hastings, C. B.

The schooner *Henry Dicks* has arrived at Georgetown from Port Hastings with coal, and goes to Montague to load produce.

The schooner *Joseph O.* sailed from Georgetown yesterday for Glace Bay, C. B., with a cargo of produce, shipped by A. A. McDonald & Bros.

The schooner *Sarah L. Oxner*, to load coal for Port Hastings, to town coal for Alberton. From there she will load oats for Newfoundland.

The remodeling of the post office at Georgetown has been completed, the work being performed very satisfactorily by B. D. Huntley, contractor of Charlottetown. Prior to his departure from Georgetown, Mr. Huntley was presented with an address and a gold headed cane by his friends.
