BACHELORS APLENTY IN CANADA'S NORTH

WINNIPEG, Nov. 6 — (CP) — Canada's northland provides an abundant field for husband-hunting women as long as they don't mind the cold. Bachelors are numerous with eligible males including Mounties, trappers, radio men and even missionaries, says Rt. Rev. Henry Martin, Bishop of Saskatchewan who recently returned from the Arctic.

Bishop Martin, formerly rector of St. George's Church, Winnipeg, journeyed this year to Anglican missions in the north on behalf of Rev. A. L. Fleming, Bishop of the Arctic.

He doesn't seriously recommend housekeeping in the Arctic. "It's no life for a woman," he said. "Still if you have a can opener you'd get along fine."

Through his meeting with Eskimos he has come to the conclusion that life among the natives of the far north has changed.

"There was a time when the Eskimos who wanted another man's wife killed the other man before taking her," he said. "But that's all changed now."

"I've never known a people who have so little of this world's good and yet are so happy. As always the Eskimos only fight is for existence in the great northern waste lands. Consequently, in the past few years, his race has been one of the few that have been unconcerned with the battles raging in the rest of the world."

The Eskimos were found to be in good physical condition, Bishop Martin said. Apparently the disease doctors have to watch for is tuberculosis and there were very few cases detected.
