THE death of John Steele occurred at Brookville a few miles from St. John Sunday. The deceased was 89 years old and leaves one son, Rev. Dr. Steele of Amherst and one daughter Mrs. H. L. Everett of St. John. Mr. Steele was a native of Dumfriesshire, Scotland. He was married in England and came to this country in 1845 landing at Boultenhouse wharf, Sackville. He was for many years in customs at Halifax. His wife died many years ago and as he has resided lately with his daughter at St. John. Until the present year Mr. Steele has been a remarkably active man for his years. He was at Amherst on a visit to his son last year, where he was photographed in a group of eight, all over eighty. In St. John he was a regular attendant at the Leinster street Baptist church. It was always worth while to talk to the old gentleman, not only because he remembered so much that was interesting, but because of his cheerful point of view and his kindly way in which he spoke of all men, even those with whom he disagreed.

THE New York Telegram says:—The opportunity of hearing Sousa's Band for the last time this Fall called out an audience that filled the Metropolitan Opera House throughout last night. It was an appreciative gathering, moreover, and there was no stint of applause. There were three encores at least to each number, so that the program was stretched out to an unusual length.
