**Captain is on Trial Charged With Murder**

NEW YORK Feb. 2—Captain Charles H. Miles of the United States Shipping Board steamer Van Buren is on trial charged with having beaten to death on the high seas last June, H. G. Baxter, the ship's steward.

R. Condit of Chicago, with his daughter was a passenger on the Van Buren. The night before Baxter's death, he testified, Captain Miles told him he expected to have to "go below" and deal with a member of the crew who had "refused to work." Condit saw the skipper on deck the next day, and asked how he "came out" with the man Baxter. "He's dead," the steward replied. The steward's body was "slipped over the side that same day. Condit testified the captain was staggering from liquor when he first told of his trouble with Baxter.

Small Sener, assistant steward, told the story that Baxter was "stricken all his first day aboard; that he was placed in the ship's hospital, and that when released he was handcuffed and chained to a stanchion in the hold for plauding illness when ordered on duty. The steward's assistant told of slipping through a manhole into Baxter's place of confinement and while there seeing Captain Miles strike the prisoner several times. That night Baxter was returned to the hospital where he died.

**Weather In England Reported Variable**

LONDON, Feb. 2—Yesterday was a day of weather contrasts in London. An impenetrable fog hung over large areas while other districts less than a mile away, basked in bright sunshine.

England has had very variable weather this winter. The densest fog was in the Thames Valley and the southeast of London and was responsible for serious disorganization of railway traffic. Train journeys which normally take 25 minutes, at most half an hour, are now 4 or 4 1/2 hours. The day was the coldest this year. In the suburbs 9 to 12 degrees of frost was recorded.

On the Brighton line there was a thick white fog all the way to the South Downs. Trains from the south and west of England on the London and South-Western line were all very late.

There was an average delay of three hours in the arrival of trains and until well into the afternoon there were crowds of many hundreds anxiously watching the train time-boards at Waterloo.
