—DEATH OF MRS. HARRIET PETERS.—Mrs. Harriet Peters, widow of the late Capt. Charles Peters who was one of the pioneers of the town of Summerside, died on Sunday night at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. George D. Brown of Sherbrooke, at the ripe age of 88 years. The deceased was born in Devonshire, England, and when twelve years of age, in 1852, came with her parents to the Island. They landed at Port Hill, then a ship-building centre and inhabited by many natives of Devonshire, but later removed to Wilmot, then known as "Blushank". There the deceased lady whose maiden name was Harriet Ching married Capt. Chas. Peters, one of the old pioneers who had come to Summerside where many vessels were then on the stocks as a ship's riggers. Here she resided, loved and respected by all who knew her, for over sixty years. There were born to them two sons and two daughters, of whom the following survive: Capt. Fred W. Peters, of Summerside; Mrs. J. Warburton Green, of Charlottetown and Mrs. George D. Brown, with whom she had latterly resided. To these The Guardian extends sincere sympathy. The funeral takes place this (Wednesday) afternoon to St. John's Church and Cemetery at St. Eleanor's, Ven. Archdeacon White officiating.—S.
