## 9,000 BOERS REPULSED

### Sir William Symons is Fatally Wounded--The British Losses Are Heavy.

## SEVERAL BOER GUNS ARE CAPTURED AT GLENCOE

### A French Canadian Member Resigns as a Protest To The Sending of the Canadian Contingent --Twenty Men of Infantry School to Join Canadian Contingent--Two Nova Scotia Lady Nurses Volunteer--The War Office Buying Supplies in Toronto.

LONDON, Oct. 20. (Special)—There was fighting to-day at Glencoe and Sir Wm. Symons, English leader was fatally wounded.

Boers strength was 9000 with heavy guns, but the garrison repulsed them.

Boers have captured a British baggage train near Ladysmith. The Boers are advancing on Haltingespruit.

At Glencoe troops captured Boer guns. British losses are heavy. News of victory received with great enthusiasm here.

LONDON, October 20.—The Daily Mail's Cape Town correspondent says that a refugee who has reached Grahamstown, from the Rand states that a train arrived at Johannesburg on Monday from Klerksdorp with 300 wounded burghers. Every available conveyance, the refugee says was called into requisition to take the wounded men to the hospital.

The Daily Mail suggests that these wounded were from Mafeking. The Daily News' Cape Town correspondent says: "It is rumored here that news has reached Deaar Junction that the Boers attacked Mafeking in force, but were repulsed.

The defenders seeing the enemy retreating pursued them for some distance. Then a feint was made and they commenced to retire on the town, allowing themselves to be driven in by the Boers, who, eager to retrieve their position again advanced to the attack and were drawn over Lyddite mines laid for the defense of the town.

It is reported that fifteen hundred Boers were killed by the explosion. It is reported from Delagoa Bay that the Swazi king Buua is collecting his forces with the object, presumably of attacking the Boers.

The Portuguese forces at Delagoa Bay will be raised to war strength. It is announced from Pretoria that an eccentric person known as Baron de Guinsberg, has been court martialled and shot as a spy. Plans of the local forts were found in his possession.

Orange River, October 19. (Afternoon delayed in transmission).—The Boers suffered a reverse on Sunday at Spruitfontein, ten miles south of Kimberley. An armored train went out to bring in a train reported to have been captured by the

Boers near the Spruitfontein siding. A party of Boers were encamped nearby lowered the railway signal and displayed a white flag apparently with the idea of inducing the driver to proceed. The driver suspected that the Boers were in possession and stopped the train, whereupon Boers issued in large force and opened fire, but without any effect.

The soldiers replied from the train and about half a dozen Boers were killed. The British were unscratched.

Several hundred Boers surprised a party of 13 Cape Colony police who were guarding the railway at Riverton Road, eighteen miles north of Kimberley on Sunday morning. The police retired. A terrific explosion was heard later and it is believed that the Boers blew up the station.

A relief party of 25 police sent from Kimberley met the Boers near Riverton. The enemy displayed a white flag to induce the troops to fall into their trap, but the police were ordered to retire. Then the Boers opened a heavy fire upon them discharging about four hundred rounds. A bullet struck a horse of Sergeant Major Cullivan, who, with a trooper whose horse had stumbled and dismounted him was captured.

MONTREAL, Oct. 20. (Special)—Henry Bourassa, Liberal Member for Labelle has resigned as a protest to the sending of the Canadian Contingent to the Transvaal.

St. JOHN, Oct. 20. (Special)—Twenty men of infantry school have volunteered for Transvaal and have been accepted. L. McLean arrived this afternoon and Lieut. J. H. C. Ogilvy, R. C. A. Quebec has been appointed in place Lt. Kays, of Hamilton.

OTTAWA, Oct. 20. (Special)—Two Maxim guns and some bicycles be sent with Canadian Contingent.

HALIFAX, Oct. 20. (Special)—Two Nova Scotia ladies have volunteered as nurses—Miss Rose Fairbanks, Halifax and Miss Eaton, Truro.

TORONTO, Oct. 20. (Special)—The War Office is asking for Canadian hay for South Africa and will also buy pressed vegetables and is making a distinct rise in London prices in grains, hoes, leather and many articles Canada could furnish.

### The Abbots Return.

The Abegweit-Crescent Football Team returned last night by the S. S. Princess. The boys are considerably down in weight from the two recent hard struggles; otherwise they are in good health and spirits.

When the team played the Dalhousie more than half the men were suffering from sea sickness. A change in the game was responsible for the Dalhousie's large score.

The Wanderers will come to Charlottetown in about two weeks and endeavor to regain the championship.

In commenting on the game the Chronicle says:

This is the second defeat which the Abegweits have administered the Wanderers and the latter club has never carried off the palm of victory from the tight little Island team. The result is all the more surprising considering the good stand made by the Wanderers against the Irishmen. It is the second defeat which the Wanderers have suffered within a week at football and is an unprecedented experience in their history as a club.

They had underestimated the strength of their opponents and suffered for it. The quartets, Harrington and Dauphinee, played such a wretched game and with so little tact and vim that if they play like that on Saturday the Dalhousie quarters will simply have it all to themselves. It was decidedly an off day for the Wanderers, and while smarting under the defeat they must nevertheless accept it with good grace.

There was quite a large crowd gathered to witness the game, probably 4000 people being there. The Wanderer's supporters gave little support to their team from behind the ropes, no doubt realizing that the boys were not at their best. Criticisms were free and un stinted, and only when Stephen scored the try that was kicked into a goal by Unlacke did any life appear among the Wanderers on the grounds. On the other hand the Abegweits were given a considerable share of praise, and received many ovations as their quick work told against the trophy champions. The game itself was played for the most of the time in the Wanderer's territory, and only twice in the whole course of the game was the Abegweits goal in danger.
