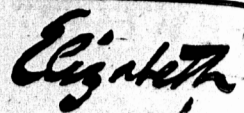

S'side Sportsmen Feed Game Birds

During the winter months Summerside members of the Fish and Game Association have distributed throughout Prince County about two ton of feed, grit and sand in order to help preserve

the Hungarian partridges in this Province. The first distribution was made by plane but it was felt that this is a somewhat hit and miss system and an organized system was undertaken by the members to get the feed to those particular sections where the Huns were definitely known to be. Assisted by the members of the R.C.M.P. and by any travellers going through the country the feed was sent out from the shop of Mr. George Bowness, where it is

stored, and eventually reached the outlying sections where required. The members of the Association made no canvass of the country for funds although several generous donations were received from interested out-of-town parties. All feed and grit was purchased with funds donated privately by the members themselves. Although some requests have been received from certain sections to have the feed shipped direct, the association wishes to have it
