BUTTER CHEESE AND EGGS.—Prices of creamery butter are a shade easier at Montreal says the Maritime Merchant but this has not affected local market, as the make of fresh made creamery prints locally is now hardly equal to requirements and the butter that is easier in Montreal is held better. Cheese is a shade firmer locally due to the usual scramble among wholesalers at this time of year to secure stocks for winter requirements. The prices in the primary market remain unchanged, as the British food purchasing commission is still paying the same price decided upon some time ago, namely 25 cents f.o.b. warehouse Montreal. Receipts of eggs have the past ten days which the usual shown considerable increase during had anticipated, and while quotations remain the same the market is easier, which will no doubt be reflected in prices before the week is out.

RETAIL MERCHANTS CONVENTION.—The Maritime Merchant says: Every merchant throughout the country, particularly the Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island merchant in the smaller places, should make an effort to be in Halifax to attend the R.M.A. convention. If he is not already a member of the R.M.A. he should become one. There is no class of business in which a man is more likely to get into a rut than the general store in the small place. We only need to look at the stocks of a great many stores to see what was in the same places this year that they were five years ago (nothing changed) to be impressed with this fact. The best stores everywhere usually are those which have kept competition—stores whose proprietors see what the other fellows are doing and then try to go them one better. A visit to the large places, therefore, is a most necessary thing for every man who lives in a smaller place, and to come to Halifax at the time of the R.M.A. convention, if it is the success that the local executive expects to make it should be particularly valuable to him. In pre-war days a great many Nova Scotia merchants came to Halifax at the time of the fall exhibition. They did not come so much for the exhibition as for the holiday and the chance to see what was going on in their own line of business. The exhibition, however, was an excuse because everyone was going and there were special transportation rates. This year there is to be no exhibition in Halifax, and perhaps not next year, and so the R.M.A. convention comes along as an equally suitable excuse. The "Merchant" hopes that this excuse will be made the most of; that there will be a large number of visiting merchants in Halifax Oct. 14th to 16th.

SHEDIAC'S PROPOSAL.—At the recent celebration at Shediac the Minister of Lands and Mines announced that in keeping with the endeavors of Shediac to have Shediac harbor developed into a St. Catharines of the Maritime Provinces, the citizens had donated a splendid silver cup to be competed for annually at Shediac by Maritime rowing fours and to be awarded permanently to the club winning it at three annual events.
