**INSTITUTE MEETING.**—On Saturday evening, June 15th, the Elmira Women's Institute met at the home of Mrs. J. J. Campbell, with an attendance of eight members and one visitor. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted. Business matters were then discussed, after which the members decided to present Pte. Louis Mellick, a returned soldier, with a five dollar gold piece out of the funds. A very interesting paper "Improvement of the home grounds" was read by Miss Jessie Campbell. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.

**MT. STEWART CONVENTION.**—The Eastern Teachers Convention, held in Mt. Stewart on Friday, June 14th, was very successful, there being between fifty and sixty teachers present. In the afternoon great interest was taken in the discussion of teachers' salaries, Judge Fraser, of Souris, in speaking on this subject compared the cost of living today with the cost of living at the time the School Act was passed in 1877. No doubt the amount of money received by the teachers in those days was almost sufficient for living expenses but the same amount—or very little more—is not sufficient in these days of high prices. It is the duty of all rate-payers to see that the teachers receive more money this year than heretofore. Judge Fraser also spoke of the poor course of studies, and of the great number of young men and young women who fail in the matriculation examinations and in college. Girls and boys of average intelligence enter Prince of Wales College, sometimes at great cost to, and sacrifice on the part of the parents and after attending college for the full term, fail in the final examination. The money saved by parents has been wasted, surely there must be some remedy. Corporal Hughes then spoke of the plan of Union among teachers and a vote was taken on this question which was carried unanimously in favor of Union. At the evening meeting which was largely attended by the rate-payers some very surprising facts were made known about the financial condition of some of the teachers of P. E. I. The rate-payers present no doubt made a note of these facts and will govern themselves accordingly in voting the supplements for 1918-19. Mr. Murray, of Mt. Stewart, Mr. J. P. Gordon, of Charlottetown, Inspector Cairns, Mr. Wm. Cain, Mr. Feehan, Mr. L. W. Shaw and others took part in the discussion. Prof. McLarty, of Prince of Wales College gave a very interesting and instructive illustrated lecture, dealing with the importance of our schools. The meeting closed with the singing of God Save the King.

### War Garden Bulletin

**PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACKYARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN.**

Issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with experts on the staff of the Dominion Experimental Farm.

KEEP AT IT.

"The prospects for an extremely high vegetable yield this year are of the brightest, provided the weather keeps right," declares one of the officials at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa. "Keep hoeing." There is an inclination on hot, drowsy June days to let the garden "go hang" but that would be a pity, indeed; for gardens need continuous attention and soon show neglect. Keep hoeing although it is warm.

Go on, with successional sowings of lettuce, corn, beans, beets, radishes etc. Only in this way will you be making the most of the ground at your disposal. Remember that the peas need hilling when they are six inches high to prevent their being broken in the wind.

Cut the weeds down in the morning so that they will wither during the day in the hot sun. Then you can rake them up in the evening. The ground between the vegetable rows should be constantly stirred. Do not be satisfied merely with keeping the weeds in check but increase the fruitfulness of the ground by continuous cultivation.

### RUSSIAN APPEAL TO U. S. TO SEND ARMED FORCE

WASHINGTON, June 12.—An appeal to the United States and the Allies to send an expeditionary force to Russia to repel the German invaders forwarded by the central committee of the cadet party in Russia was transmitted to the state department today by the Russian embassy. It is asked that the expedition, if sent be put under international control to guarantee the rights of Russia. The cadet party, as it is popularly called, is composed of the constitutional democrats who were first in power after the overthrow of the Romanoff dynasty. It was removed from power by the Bolsheviks.

### U. S. Reticent

The United States has not defined its attitude towards the Allied desire for joint action from the east, although it is understood by the government that it would be inopportune to attempt to check the Germans in Russia unless it is shown the Russian people wish it and that the move would not be misunderstood. The message of the constitutional democrats declares the situation in which Russia has been placed by the terms of the Brest-Litovsk treaty only can be ameliorated by the active aid of the Allies. The advance of the German armies, it is declared, otherwise cannot be halted.

### COAL SITUATION IN WEST VERY BAD

MONTREAL, June 17.—Women freezing in the hearts of Canadian Western cities, and towns, families deserting their houses to go and huddle

in cramped quarters with those who happen to have a little coal, closed schools, office buildings, and even hospitals and possible epidemics of pneumonia and influenza, are foreshadowed in a statement issued this morning by the Canadian Railway War Board.

"This board cannot possibly exaggerate the gravity of the Western fuel situation," said Secretary W. M. Neal. "Only the seriousness of the situation prompts the board to issue what may be termed an alarming statement."

"Canada's coal supply from foreign mines will be curtailed this year. The West will find itself compelled to use Western coal. And to obtain that Western coal it might be ordered now and moved now."

"In the Fall every east-bound car from the foot of the Rockies to Winnipeg will be required for crop movement. The Western coal, if it does not start to move until then, will compete for cars with the wheat movement vital to the allies and to our own fighting men."

"Today cars are plentiful and operating conditions are comparatively easy. The railways under the direction of the Canadian Railway War Board are prepared to move the greater part of next Winter's supply now, but we find that the mines are loading only a fraction of the supply of cars available to them."

"A solution must be found promptly if the West is to be saved from distress, if not disaster, next Winter."
