IN MEMORIAM

JOHN W. BROWN

The funeral of Mr. John W. Brown whose death notice appeared in the issue of December 2, took place on Saturday afternoon, December 3rd, 1932, from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Gordon Laird of North Rustico.

The service was conducted by his pastor Rev. W. A. Patterson of Cavendish, assisted by Revs. W. G. Quigley and W. J. MacLeod. The speaker fervently endeavored to impress his hearers with the necessity of being armored with like faith, courage and patience of the deceased who had suffered long years of pain and inability and had through the grace given him, kept the faith, finished the course and entered in to the rest prepared for the people of God.

The late Mr. Brown was born at New Glasgow, P. E. I., August 4, 1846, and had therefore attained the age of 86 years. In June 1872, he married Agnes Smith, eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. George Smith. To this union were born two sons and three daughters, viz: William of Elmsdale, N. S.; DeWitt T., of New Glasgow, P. E. I.; Agnes Rollings deceased in Jan. 1925, Martha and Margaret J. (Mrs. Gordon Laird) of North Rustico.

His wife who had been his most loving and loved companion and helper, predeceased him by five years. Mr. and Mrs. Brown and family lived on the Brown homestead in Mayfield for the long period of 58 years, and there celebrated, with an unbroken family circle their golden wedding, June 20, 1922. Two and one-half years ago he came to North Rustico to reside with his daughter and her husband and was an honored guest in the home, receiving the homage of loving hands and hearts.

BERLIN, Dec. 19.—Crown jewels and other valuables belonging to the late Russian Czar, Nicholas II, and his family, with an estimated value of 500,000 marks (119,000, currently), are to be auctioned off here at a sale tomorrow, according to the Berliner Nachtausgabe.

This newspaper avers that the jewels have been removed from the steel chambers of the Soviet Bank at Moscow and are being sold surreptitiously in Berlin to prevent members of the Romanoff family from obtaining a court injunction prohibiting the gems from being put under the hammer.

Says Aviation Assures Peace And Good Will

GLAND'S NOTED AIR MARSHALL CONTENTS FLYING FORCES ARE GREAT-DETERRENTS AGAINST WAR

LONDON, Dec. 20.—(C. P.)—Air Marshal Sir Geoffrey Salmond, the present commander-in-chief of Britain's air defence and selected to succeed his brother John next year as Chief of the Air Staff, brought a note of reality into the disarmament controversy in a speech recently. His defence of the air arm, which is threatened with drastic "cuts" and even abolition, took the form of a reasoned argument; that air forces are the greatest deterrent against war that could possibly be invented. He suggested that the proposal to abolish air forces originated in a fundamental misconception—the war, which is only a process of organized killing, can be made humane.

He added that statesmen and others who contemplate a war nowadays or in the future know well that by aggression they lay open their countries to terrible attacks from the enemy, who will take no notice of the old frontiers, but will transfer the attack immediately to the home front. "With this possibility existing," he asked, "are they so likely to take upon themselves the responsibility of creating a war?"

Much of the appalling mischief wrought by the last great war followed as a direct consequence on its long duration. Millions of men were thrown into an almost static conflict, millions of them were killed or wounded, while at home privation and hardship led to the loss of hundreds of thousands of lives as well as causing injury to the physique of the people of the defeated nations which will endure to the third and fourth generation. With this in mind Sir Geoffrey went on to point out that the chief danger to civilization was the prolongation of war.

"Anything that can shorten a war—and the air forces of the world are the most powerful arm to do such a thing—should not be abolished, but should be retained," he said. "It was largely due to the presence of the Royal Air Force in the outposts of the Empire that peace had reigned there since the war—a concluding statement which the Air Marshal said he could have backed up with incontrovertible facts.

Me and I

Those who must advertise themselves have little to commend them. Actions of those who meet such people warrant this decision. If you have some good qualities let others tell about them.

ROYALTY ATTEND NOBEL FESTIVAL

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, Dec. 20.—(C.P.)—The recent programme of the Nobel Festival in the Stockholm Concert Hall when four Nobel Prize winners received their awards, was a brilliant affair. No less than 14 members of the royal family including the King, the Crown Prince and Crown Princess, were present and the King personally handed over the prizes to the winners viz. Prof. Irving Langmuir for chemistry, Prof. Charles Sherrington for physiology and Prof. E. D. Adrian for medicine. Finally John Galsworthy received his prize for literature.

The awarding of the prizes was preceded by special addresses by leading Swedish authorities in the respective departments of the prize winners and the president of the board of the Nobel Foundation, the former premier and ex-governor Hjalmar Hammarskjold, gave the address of welcome.

NO PIE FOR KING THIS YEAR

LONDON, Dec. 20.—(C.P.)—Every year for 114 years Ireland's viceroys have sent the reigning monarch at Yuletide "four and twenty woodcocks baked in a pie!" When the new regime began in Ireland, Tim Healy, the first Governor-General, carried on the custom as did James McNeill, who resigned a short time ago. The pie always was delivered by special courier and was accompanied by a message of Christmas greeting.

Now, after a century, it is thought probably that Donald Buckley, the new Governor-General, will ignore the custom.
