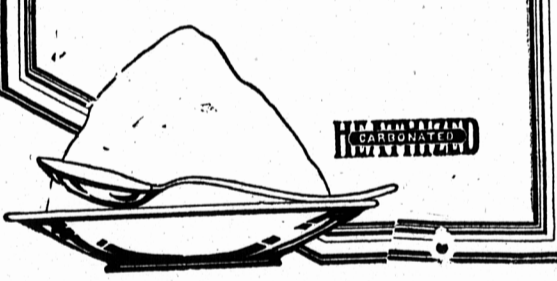

In order to encourage a midsummer supply of market hogs and maintain uniformity and regularity in production the July Bacon Hog Competition open to residents of Prince Edward Island, has been established for the year 1927.

Prize Money amounting to a maximum of \$250.00 has been contributed equally by the Federal Live Stock Branch and the Provincial Department of Agriculture. Five pigs farrowed between January 1st and February 15th and farrowed the property of the contestant constitute an entry. Entries which will be scored in July, must be made before pigs are six weeks old. No Competition will be held unless there are fifteen entries. An entrance fee of \$1.00 will be charged.
