SUM'SIDE AND WEST

The Latest News From Prince County.

MR. David Kirke, left yesterday for Sydney.

MESSRS. Wm. Stewart and J. G. Baker, returned home yesterday.

THE Summerside Cornet Band will render music at the Boys' Brigade entertainment this evening.

PREPARATIONS are being made for a grand school concert to be held in Darnley Hall on Friday April 29th at 7.30 p. m.

THE first sailing vessel to enter Summerside harbor this spring was the Schr. Lois, Capt. Matthew Gunn with coal from Picton, which arrived yesterday morning at 4 o'clock.

It would be a great advantage to tourists and the travelling public generally to have a boat plying between Summerside and Cape Tormentine twice daily. It seems to be the most natural route.

THE steamer Elliott arrived in Summerside from Charlottetown en route to Sydney at 10 o'clock yesterday morning. Thus the Summerside-Sydney route is opened before the Summerside, Point du Chene route.

THE Summerside Board of Trade has made a move to have the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route opened without the assistance of the Charlottetown Board. When this route is once established the people of this Province will wonder why it was not opened many years ago.

THE inward cargo by the steamer Elliott yesterday consisted of 37 puncheons of molasses, a quantity of sugar and sundries. She to-k away 25 fat cattle shipped by Mr. Barrett Henderson to Newfoundland, 230 bags of oats and potatoes, 6 dressed hogs, and some small freight for Sydney.

MR. John Johnson, of Bedeque, came nearly meeting with a severe accident in Summerside yesterday afternoon. He had loaded his truck wagon at the Railway Station and while driving along Water Street the horse became frightened and ran. Mr. Johnson fell beneath the wagon but held on pluckily until the beast was stopped after he had gone a short distance. There was no particular damage and the driver escaped with a few slight scratches on his head.

THE quarterly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held Tuesday evening at which there was a fairly good attendance. The Vice-President, Mr. Neil McQuarrie, occupied the chair. After routine work, the usual batch of correspondence was read. The mail and train service was discussed at considerable length, most of those present taking part. A good deal of dissatisfaction was expressed in reference to the mail arrangements, and the unanimous opinion was that there is inexcusable neglect in connection with this service. It was urged that one of the Government steamers should have been kept on the Charlottetown-Picton route in connection with the Princess in order to avoid the present conditions by which mails arriving at Picton at 2 a. m. are so detained that they do not reach Charlottetown until 7 p. m. With steamers lying idle at the Charlottetown wharves it was thought that the people of the Province should not be deprived of a mail service. It was argued that while the service is at the mercy of one company, as at present, no improvement could be expected. Mr. Neil McQuarrie expressed the opinion that in view of the unsatisfactory character of the correspondence just read, it was useless to hope for any improvement, and the time has now arrived when this part of the Province should make a radical move. The service given by the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company is not sufficient for the demands of the country. From interviews and correspondence with interested parties here and in New Brunswick he was in a position to state that a Company could be formed with sufficient capital to provide a suitable boat to ply between Summerside and Cape Tormentine. Two trips a day could be made by this route when necessary—the cost of both trips being less than that of one round trip to Point du Chene; the whole of the passenger traffic could be secured for a boat on the shorter route; a more regular and efficient service could be maintained than at present. Messrs. R. T. Holman, John A. Sharp, E. H. Wright, R. L. Romcke and others, concurred in the opinion. On motion of Mr. John A. Sharp, seconded by Mr. R. T. Holman, it was resolved "that in the opinion of this Board it is desirable to take steps at once towards the formation of a Company for the establishment of a steamboat line to ply between Summerside and Cape Tormentine." The resolution was carried unanimously, after which ways and means for the organization were discussed. In reference to the present train arrangements the fact that no mails are carried on the late train from Summerside to Charlottetown was severely criticized. It was also thought strange that no mention is made in the Railway time table of the early train from Cape Traverse to Summerside. The public do not know anything about the movements of this train, if they did—if it were advertised it could be made use of.

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SAW HIS OWN GRAVE.

COLESBERG April 10.—An intelligence officer stationed at Petrusville was treated by Commandant Hertzog with death by shooting, in the event of his being caught. The officer subsequently accompanied the troops in the Orange River Colony and was captured at Jagersfontein, tried, and sentenced to death by Hertzog. He was kept waiting until the sentence was confirmed by De Wet. He was then made to witness the digging of his own grave. When the time came for his execution he was told that he was let off this time. The officer was practically stripped of his clothing and then released.
