BEEF EXPORT RESUMES

The current Live Stock Market Report of the Dominion Department of Agriculture carries an item of more than ordinary interest relating to the resumption of the export trade with Great Britain after a lapse of more than a year. The Manchester Commerce took the first overseas shipment of 128 head. These cattle were purchased in the Toronto yards and were of the type known as "high

Manchester feeders," averaging around 1100 pounds in weight. Another shipment of some 200 head is now reported as being on its way to seaboard from Alberta for direct slaughter shipment. "This enterprise on the part of the producer, trade and steamship companies should invite a renewal of confidence in the market, and indeed is already having a good moral effect," observes the report.

THE MARKETS

QUEBEC, Que., Sept. 7.—The total potato crop of the Province of Quebec this year will be about seven million hundredweights, or approximately fifty per cent less than last year, according to present estimates by the Quebec Department of Agriculture. The crop last year was 14,429,000 hundredweights for the 162,411 acres planted with potatoes. This year's crop has been badly damaged by rust.

POTATOES

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 7.—The potato shipments have been moving freely from N. B. during the last few days. The demand is chiefly from Upper Canada and Cuba. The first big shipment to Cuba is to go from St. John during the present week. A. D. McCain of Frier's Cove, Vice President of the Association of potato shippers of New Brunswick estimates the New Brunswick crop at from 10 to 20 per cent less than last year, although the acreage is slightly more than last season. So far the movement has been in Irish cobbles, which are bringing 90 cents a barrel in the Woodstock district. The digging of green mountains potatoes is not yet underway.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 7.—A strong winter market and a yield of about 80 per cent of the crop of 1929 is the potato outlook in Nova Scotia, according to M. Cummings of the Provincial Department of Agriculture. Potato acreage this season increased five per cent and the yield per acre is estimated at about 75 per cent of the 1929 crop. The quality is extra good and no rot has been reported. The present market is low but dealers anticipate a strong winter demand.

PROHIBITION COURT AT ALBERTON AND SUMMERSIDE—The Prohibition Magistrate held Court at Alberton and Summerside on Friday and Saturday. On Friday afternoon, he heard several cases at Summerside. They were all cases, concerning the consumption of liquor contrary to the Prohibition Act. One person was fined \$20 and costs or thirty days, another \$30 and costs or thirty days and a third \$10 or twenty days. Two were dismissed and five not served. One man fined \$10 or twenty days paid his fine. On Saturday morning, the Magistrate heard charges against six persons, all for the illegal consumption of liquor, who were fined \$10 and costs or fifteen days. Another party from Norway was fined \$30 or thirty days. For the sale of intoxicating liquor two men were fined \$300 and costs or five months in jail and another party \$200 or three months. On Saturday afternoon, the Magistrate held Court again at Summerside. In one case, where the defendant did not appear a fine of \$300 or five months was inflicted for selling intoxicating liquor on the evidence of two witnesses. The next case against a woman living in Baltic for selling liquor contrary to the Prohibition Act, was adjourned for one week to Charlottetown. A case against a Summerside party was also adjourned to Charlottetown. Another case against a Summerside man, charged with selling liquor, in which the accused denied the charge. The evidence against him was supplied by a man from whom the Prohibition Officer had taken a bottle of liquor at the Railway Station at Summerside, who had been previously twice convicted under the Prohibition Act. The accused denied selling the witness any liquor. The Magistrate adjourned the case for judgment in Charlottetown next Saturday. One case was withdrawn and another adjourned.—S.
