have met with a measure of success, and who have added to the principle that man should procure the newer realization that comes only to that man who serves the best that is in himself. The whole world today is in a chaotic condition and nothing can bring it back except the realization by business men that they are their brother's keeper. Rotary stands for a bigger, broader view of humanity, for better citizenship, for better business methods and for a keener interest in the boys, who are the business men of the future.

The speaker traced the growth of Rotary since its inception eighteen years ago. Today the organization operate under twenty flags, with 1,500 clubs and 100,000 members. He spoke of the inspiring convention held recently at St. Louis, at which thirty-nine of the total forty-one Rotary Governors were present.

To each individual Rotarian the speaker brought the message that someone was judging Rotary by him, and that it was not "playing the game" to elect officers and not stand behind them when there were work to do. In every club there are the "sleep-walkers" who need to be awakened, the "monkey-wrench" man who is eternally clogging the wheels with knicks and criticisms; but there are also the men of vision, the dreamers who are willing and able to make their dreams come true, and who are possessed of the real Rotary spirit.

A very strong vote of appreciation, moved by Rotarian Geo. S. Inman and seconded by Rotarian Percy Pope, was extended by the presidents to Dr. Spangler on behalf of the Club. The District Governor's remark that the warmth of his reception tempted him to again visit Charlottetown in the near future was greeted with enthusiastic applause.

ber for Gullford has been adopted there.

LONDON, Nov. 22.—H. G. Wells, the writer, who is contesting London University in the Labor interest, strongly emphasizes in his election addresses the cleavage between the Liberal and Labor parties. He says that the Liberal party offers no remedies whatever for unemployment but imply and poses the remedies suggested by both Conservative and Labor parties.

"That," declares Mr. Wells, "in the face of our present needs, is a monstrously cruel and cowardly policy."

Mr. Wells supports a capital levy which he declares is "a special conscription of credit from rich men for the general need in a time of profound economic distress."

While Liberals and Laborites are thus increasingly at loggerheads the reconciliation among the Liberals themselves is becoming more strongly cemented. A pliquant incident today illustrated this reconciliation.

During the Liberals' feud with Lloyd George, the former Premier was so closely identified with the Conservatives in the coalition, the National Liberal Club of London, which is the home of Asquith, Liberalism, voted the removal of portraits of Lloyd George and Winston Spencer Churchill from the dining room of the club, and these portraits were, accordingly, relegated to the basement of the building. Today the committee of the club unanimously voted their restoration to their former place of honor in the dining room.

warm congratulations from his former colleagues of the Foreign Office and from the other members of the Ambassador's Council. Speculation as to the impression the notes will make in Berlin tends toward the belief that Chancellor Stresemann will find them as mild and as conciliatory as it could be possible to expect. The general opinion among diplomats is that the German Chancellor will find it advisable to do all he can to comply with the Allied demands rather than risk another note harsher in tone and terms, though some believe that the great delay in reaching a decision will weaken its effect.

The clearing of the diplomatic atmosphere was so evident that the correspondents waiting in the cold dusk had to ask no questions to know that the Entente had been saved.

DUKE SEEKS U. S. MILLIONS FOR HANOVER TREASURES

VIENNA, Nov. 22.—Duke Ernest August of Cumberland, 78 and hard up, is said to be negotiating with Paris jewelers for the sale to an American of treasures of the Guelphs. These he brought to Austria when he was forced to leave Hanover, over which principally he ruled until it was absorbed by Prussia after the Austro-Prussian war in 1866. The price mentioned is \$30,000,000.

Austria has objected to the exportation of the art objects, but the duke has replied that they were never in public museums, that Austria has no claim on them and that the country will lose the 59 percent export tax if it interferes. He claims the right to dispose of them as he pleases.

The duke's son, the Duke of Brunswick, married the only daughter of the former kaiser in 1912. The duke's willingness to sell the Hanover plate is regarded as an indication that he has abandoned all hope of having his family restored to power in Hanover.
