AA PUBLIC MEETING

The first public meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous in the Maritime Provinces was on March 4, in the Merchant Seamen's Club. The meeting — open to all those suffering from and interested in the cure of alcoholism — was addressed by a prominent member of Alcoholics Anonymous, of New York City.

AA, as it is called by its members, was formed fourteen years ago and has more than 80,000 members in some 150 groups in Canada and the United States.

To date there are seven active groups in the Maritimes — in Halifax, Amherst, Saint John, Summerside and Charlottetown.

"LIQUOR AND THE HOME"

(The Candian White Ribbon Tidings)

Liquor threatens the peace of the home.

"I have seen strong drink make fine fellows into cruel beasts. I have seen alcohol cause men just as good as I am, to become utterly selfish." — Sir Wilfred Grenfell

Liquor threatens the stability and wealth of all homes.

"Liquor sale is the chief competitor with decent business. The rapid increase in the proportion of Canadian income spent for beer, wine and spirits gives much concern to all people who have our nation's best interests at heart. Today Canadians spend more money on beer, wine and spirits than on the purchase and operation of all motor vehicles. Booze expenditures are equivalent to the total Canadian purchase of home furnishings... This liquor business today is the chief threat to the continued success of all good business in Canada." — Dr. J. R. Mutchmor.

Liquor threatens the life and health of those in the home.

Of the 720 killed and 13,000 injured in motor accidents in Ontario last year, liquor was a contributing cause to 324 deaths and 6,000 injured, according to Professor Joslyn Rogers' verdict of forty-five per cent of highway accidents as caused by drinking by driver or pedestrian.

Liquor threatens the ideals of the home.

Through radio, billboard, magazine and movie, our children are influenced to accept social standards where:

All smart people drink.

It is fun to get light.

Hard drinking is the logical resort of anyone who is disappointed in love or business.

The Liquor Traffic looks upon our children as its future customers. Unless the Traffic can have 200,000 boys and girls from each generation as future patrons, it must shut up shop. The Traffic declares: "Our business is dependent largely in the creation of appetite for drink."

CHILDREN OF U. N.

At Lake Success on February 28 this year, children from twenty-six countries spoke on the problem of hungry children throughout the world, and what can be done to relieve their distress.

In a recording from Prague, a nine-year-old boy spoke to the conference through an interpreter. They told the other children, "We shall never fight each other."

The meeting was called by the United Nations Appeal for Children. Those taking part in the discussions were the sons and daughters of U. N. employees from all over the world. More than 400 children from New York City schools attended.

Like most other groups meeting here, the children wound up by adopting a resolution:
