GALES OF LAUGHTER DRIVE AWAY COPIOUS TEARS OF AUDIENCE AT PRINCE EDWARD

A tear, a smile, a sob, a chuckle! A page from the life-book of a simple family, a powerful portrayal of human emotions, is the heart-stirring story of "His People," which opened at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday.

This Universal presentation concerns the lives of Rabbi Cominsky, his wife, Rosie, and their sons, Sammy and Morris.

Scenes of singular and comfort, the crowded Ghetto actually filmed in New York's Lower East Side, a never-to-be-forgotten snow storm, a championship prizefight, are but a few of the realistic sights awaiting one at the Prince Edward Theatre.

An all-star cast has been selected for the many difficult roles. Rudolph Schildkraut, renowned European dramatic artist, will be seen as Rabbi Cominsky; Mrs. Rosa Rosanova, who was such a sensational success in "Hungry Hearts," is Rosie, the mother; George Lewis, a noted comedienne plays Mrs. Shannon, the sympathetic neighbor, and Blanche Mehaffey Wampas Baby Star, her daughter, Mammie.
