CONQUEST OF QUEBEC WONDERFUL PICTURE

IMPERIAL CROWDED WITH ENTHUSIASTIC PEOPLE OF ALL AGES — OF HISTORICAL VALUE.

Wolfe, or the Conquest of Quebec, was the pictorial feature that packed the Imperial Theatre from top to bottom all day yesterday and sent the people away keyed up to a high pitch of enthusiasm and patriotic fervor. It was a remarkable film too, in many ways. It was contained in 5,000 feet, depicting the final stages of the struggle that won Canada for the British crown and with a faithfulness to detail and recorded history quite surprising. Thousands of men were employed in it, hundreds of horses, scores of old time sailing craft and every phase of the warfare that was waged at that time seemed to be re-enacted with the effect of real strife, disarming criticism and alluring wonderment. The principal roles such as Wolfe, Montcalm, Lirut, Arleigh, Madamoiselle Mars and others were counterparts of the originals as we see them in the picture books and all through the five reels it was noticeable that the Kalem Co., paid particular attention to the little details which in the eyes of keen observers might spoil the whole production. The lack of trashy sentiment and love scenes—which are often introduced in real stories to satisfy certain classes—was another thing that helped make the picture a true masterpiece a vivid portrayal of an actual and serious event. Applause punctuated the picture throughout and the Imperial's orchestra certainly did not unreasonably fine effect to the film with its patriotic music.
