FOREIGN TRADE STILL GROWING

But Exports Have Decreased from Last Year

Trade With the States Shows a Large Increase—Canada's New Fishery Cruiser at St. John's.

CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE.

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—(Special).—Canada's foreign trade for the fiscal year to June 30th last on the basis of total imports and total exports show a volume of \$472,733,638 compared with \$467,064,685 the year before.

HOW EXPORTS FEEL OFF.

The total exports alone show a decline of over twelve millions, the falling off being in our exports to the United Kingdom while our shipments to the States increased by over a million.

IMPORTS SHOW AN INCREASE.

Imports from the United States increased by over thirteen millions and from the Mother Country by nearly three millions.

CANADA'S NEW CRUISER.

St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 25.—(Special).—The Canadian fishery cruiser Canada, recently launched at Barrow arrived here today short of coal, bound for Quebec.

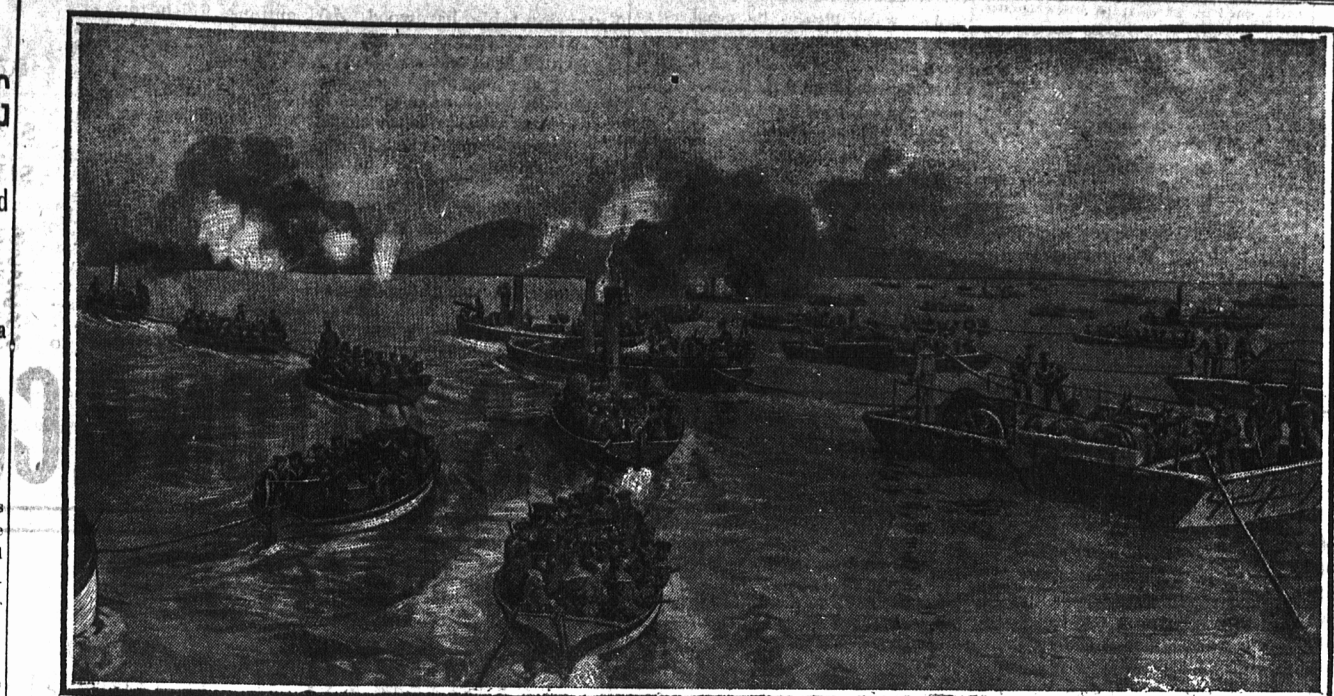

A peculiar accident happened to the schooner Laura E. Douglas formerly owned by Capt. Dick, Georgetown in the Sydney harbor Monday afternoon. While lying in the stream off No. 2 steel pier the vessel suddenly turned turtle and remained upside down until righted by the aid of a tug and a number of small boats. The members of the crew who were on board at the time were thrown into the water and after scrambling onto the vessel's bottom were rescued by boats.

The accident was caused by a heap of lumber being piled on the deck, which made the top heavy, while the sail was hoisted to the full for the purpose of drying them out. The Laura E. Douglas, which was righted and pumped out sustained no damage from the accident.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—(Special)—England protested against the detention of her ships by the Cruiser Smolensk and Russia explained that she feared the orders to desist had not reached the cruiser and asks England to assist in trying to deliver instructions.

Efforts will be made to do so through British ships from Cape Colony.

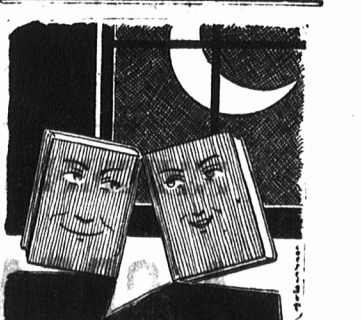
