ISLANDER BURIED BY HIS COMRADES
Mrs. James Duffy, 93 Sydney Street has received the following interesting letter from her son Wilfrid:—
Somewhere in France,
Nov. 3rd, 1915.
Dear Mother,—I am writing you a few lines today to let you know I got the socks and tobacco you sent me, and was very glad to get them for they were just what I wanted. I gave Joe Flood one of the Badges that were in your letter and half of the tobacco out of my parcel. Joe told me to tell you if you see any of his people to tell them he sent home two or three letters and got no answer. Well mother I suppose you all heard about poor Jack McLean you can tell right just outside our lines. We made a wooden cross on his grave and printed his name on it. I was talking to him two days before he was killed and he said to me he was expecting some tobacco from home and he would give me some when it came, but it came too late. He was a great favorite among the boys and we all miss him very much. But he died an honorable death and we are all ready to do the same if it falls our lot. You were saying, Frank and I would be home for Xmas, but there will be all his missing. If it is the will of God that I am spared my life we will hope all will be there for 1916, if the goose hangs high, but she will hang low for me this Xmas.
Be sure and pray for me that I will come home again to see you all. Hoping to find you all well as this leaves me the same. With love to father and yourself, not forgetting sister Mabel and Annie. I remain,

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Nov. 17.—Joseph Gorlicar, the former member of the Austria-Hungarian Consular Service whose revelations of alleged espionage activities in this country has prompted an investigation by the Department of Justice, made vigorous protest to the denials of the Austria-Hungarian Embassy and several Austrian Consuls that they had been fomenting trouble in munitions plants, and constantly intruding with spies and other secret agents. To the Providence Journal Dr. Joseph Gorlicar made this statement:
"Did anybody expect that these men were going to acknowledge the fact? I can simply give my word of honor that what I have said is the truth, and that the facts are going to be proved to the satisfaction of the American people."
"I will state further that no act of violence, or fraud, whether it be a fire in a munitions factory, the explosion of a bomb on board a ship or the establishment of a munitions plant, is planned in advance; men who can be trusted to go through with such criminal performances are selected in advance, and the whole scheme is worked through a system. Individuals are simply carrying out orders that they get from the men above them."
"My fifteen years' experience is the

foreign service of Austria-Hungary has given me exact knowledge of this spy system, which is directed by the German Embassy through Captain Boy-Ed and Captain von Papen, acting directly with Consul General Nuber in New York. These three men have full and complete knowledge of every move made by every German and Austrian spy in the United States. In spite of their assertions that they are innocent of any wrongdoing, partition of the burning of munitions plants, or the wrecking of ships, they are in immediate touch with every transaction.

"Every central empire spy operation in this country today is officially listed in the offices of these men, and their records are kept in card index form. There are, I should judge from my personal knowledge, about 3,000 of these men in the United States today and every one of them will do exactly what he is ordered to do, and besides himself, as in fact he really is, a soldier under the direct instruction of his military superiors. So one of these men would dare to act on his own responsibility in a foreign country before he had secured the approval of the representative of his Government in that country. These men have to keep in touch with the military and naval attaches of either the German or Austrian Embassy, or else with the Consuls I have named in my previous statement, and from them they secure all maps and charts, sailing lists of steamers, and the precise location of factories where ammunition is being manufactured.

"They have to visit the official representatives of their country in order to get the sums of money they need to carry out their instructions. It is a standing order in the German and Austrian Consulates that these spies are never to be given more than the amount of money necessary to carry them over the one specific job they have on hand at any one time.

"Do the American people think that Captain von Papen's somewhat innocuous statement about Americans in this letter discovered on Archibald is an isolated expression of opinion? The truth is that, since the beginning

"No passports fraud agent in New York or Cleveland or Philadelphia—and these three cities are full of them—could live and do business a day without the sanction and friendly assistance of the Austrian and German officials. When the truth is known concerning the actual sums of money for the purchase of newspapers, the subsidizing and college professors, the destruction of munitions plants, the hiring of halls, the payment of travelling expenses for hundreds of men who have been spent in this country for the purpose of the war, in every German and Austrian Consulate in this country and in both embassies Americans have been dogs and pigs' and 'beasts' whenever reference has been made to them. The people of this country do not understand the contempt with which these men view them and their almost entire freedom from restraints in every illicit act they are performing.
