scarc. The recent rains have however, improved the crop very much.

PASTURES.

The pastures have never been better. White clover is springing up all over them and copious rainfall and warm weather is likely to keep them in good condition for at least another month. The prospects for Fall and Winter feed are good, as feed that was sown for soiling purposes will not be required and can be saved for use in winter. The straw promises to be very abundant.

DAIRY.

Milk cows went on the grass in about average condition. Up to the time of writing about the usual amount of milk has been received at the factories, but during the past week the amount received has been much larger than during the corresponding week in last year. If the favorable weather continues the milk supply will be considerable above that of last year. The price of good dairy cattle continues to be very high.

Horses are about the same in number as in 1911, but of much better quality. The number of cattle is increasing. Sheep remain about constant, but on account of the educational campaign conducted during the last year, and still in progress interest has been aroused which will likely lead to a large increase in numbers. Pigs are much scarcer this year than for the last two years, they are however being better cared for. The number of hens kept continues to show a large increase. The egg supply is much greater than usual and prices are higher. Five Egg Circles have been established in the province and are now in active operation. The number of geese remains about the same. Turkeys are not as numerous, fewer being kept each year; the reason given is that they are difficult to raise.
