MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 26.—The first weekly connection between North Sydney, N. S., and Port Aux Basques, Nfld., by the S. S. "Caribou" will terminate Saturday, September 30th, and thereafter connection will be maintained twice a week, leaving North Sydney at 8.30 p. m., Tuesdays and Saturdays, according to passenger traffic officials of the Canadian National Railways here. Rail connection will be by Canadian National train No. 5 arriving at North Sydney at 7.75 p. m. The S. S. "Caribou" will arrive from North Sydney from Port Aux Basques on the same mornings.

PRODUCE MINING

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Butter and cheese prices eased while eggs firmed slightly on the Montreal dairy and produce market today. Absence of demand this week for export butter, and a lower market caused sealers to lower the price of No. 1 grade in an effort to stimulate export trade with the United Kingdom. The general quotation for carlots or less was 10 1/2 cents a pound, half a cent less than yesterday. At the weekly auction today, 647 boxes of No. 1 Quebec butter brought 12 1/2 cents a pound and 24 boxes of No. 2 butter sold at 12 cents. Receipts today were 5,021 boxes of which 3,400 represented butter enroute for export.
