DISCOUNTS THEORY THAT MARS AFFECTS THE WEATHER

MONTREAL, Nov. 3.—Reports that the recent weather had been affected by the proximity of Mars to the earth were utterly discounted by Prof. A. J. Kelly, in charge of McGill observatory here today. "Meteorologists the world over are of the opinion that the planets have no effect in the least upon the weather or upon our climate," the professor said.

Like-wise all stories of signalling to Mars are characterized as "Pure bunkum" because "experts in radio transmission tell us that the most powerful transmission stations we have in the world at present are not strong enough to transmit messages a fractional part of one per cent of the distance to Mars."

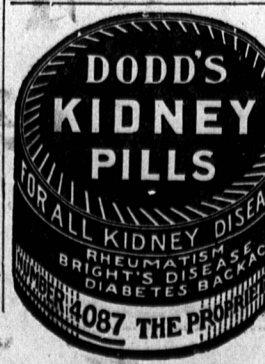

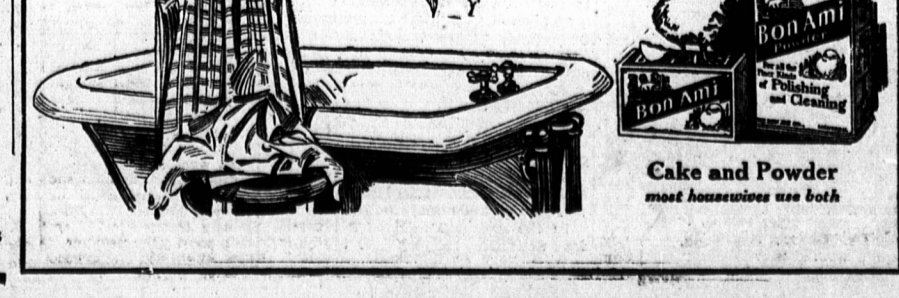
