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Rev. Murdoch Lamont

News has just arrived from Scotland that the Rev. Murdoch Lamont, formerly of Prince Edward Island, has closed his ministry in the Church on earth, and entered into his rest and reward on the 13th August, 1927, at the age of 62.

Mr. Lamont, after an attack of heart weakness, died peacefully in his home, tenderly comforted by his family. His sons, Mr. Ewen Lamont, M.A., and Prof. William D. Lamont, of Glasgow University, happened at the time to be at home on a visit.

his call to the ministry. But he was over 40, and he had a large family of 8 depending on his income. Few ever enter an Old Country University at his age.

But he had no sooner finished college and begun his work as a parish minister in Islay, than another calamity darkened the skies. The Great War broke forth upon the world.

Mr. Lamont's three sons were called to the colors. The father was asked to give his written consent; for one of them was under age. This he readily gave.

age. He never had to endure prolonged sickness. It is significant that one of Mr. Lamont's last sermons was from the text: "The Lord Whom ye seek shall suddenly come to His temple."

But his little boys were helping out in their eager little ways. And would it not have astonished him had he been told when trudging to the University with his bundle of books, that one of those little boys of his, who were selling newspapers to help out, would ere long be professor of philosophy in that same University?

Meantime present difficulties were all-engrossing, but when prospects were once more at their darkest, once more relief was at hand. A scholarship of considerable financial value was flung open for competition to the four Universities of Scotland.

Mr. Lamont used often to say of his own ministry, "My highest ambition is to be a humble link in the great chain of men and events that are advancing the glorious kingdom of Jesus Christ."

He is survived by his widow, Effie Ann, daughter of the late Sam Hume of Wood Islands, by his sons, Sam, Ewen, Donald, Willie, Malcolm, David, and by his daughters, Mrs. (Dr.) Jack, Mrs. Wilson, and Miss Ina May; also by brothers, Malcolm and Donald M., minister on P. E. Island, and sisters, Mrs. McIntosh, Mrs. McNeil, Mrs. John Hume and Mrs. Joseph Hume.

It may be added that Mr. Lamont shortly before his death, lectured before the Eccles. Soc. of the Church of Scotland in Edinburgh. This lecture was much spoken of and he was urged to publish it, and it is believed he has left the manuscript in suitable form for publication.

Mr. Murdoch Lamont's ministry before and after ordination extended well over twenty years. To the end he remained vigorous in mind and body. In the biographical history of the Christian Church many of God's laborers have prayed that they might die in harness. This divine favor fell to Mr. Lamont.
