CELEBRATES HIS NINETY - FIRST BIRTHDAY - Mr. Angus N. MacLeod, who is living with his daughter, Mrs. Large, 243 Pownall St., celebrated his ninety first birthday yesterday. Mr. MacLeod, who spent most of his life on the old homestead at Brookfield, retired from farming 20 years ago, and since then he has visited different parts of the province, and about three years ago, accompanied by his late wife, visited Vancouver and Sacramento, Cal. He is now retired in the City, and on election day polled his vote for National Government, probably the oldest voter to exercise the franchise on that occasion. Mr. MacLeod is in the enjoyment of good health, and reads regularly the newspapers and books from the library. About 69 years ago, Mr. MacLeod and a number of others went into the woods near Harcourt, N. B., and cut the first rails way for the then new mainline railway from Moncton to Charlottetown. The only railway in the Maritimes then ran from Point du theme to St. John, Moncton was built with the aid of the Bend of the Petterick. Afterward, Mr. MacLeod worked in the N. B. lumberwoods until he returned to the homestead which his father had cut out of the woods about 120 years ago. Mrs. MacLeod passed away in October last, but of a family of fourteen, eleven still survive, eight daughters and three sons, scattered from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and south of the border. The four in the province are Mrs. N. Large, Mrs. West, Mrs. McDonald, Wheelley River, Mrs. Miller MacPherson, North Wiltshire, and John P. and Nell in Charlottetown. The crew encountered very little difficulties in the trips which are being carried out so far. A complete painting job was carried out while it was laid up for the winter in addition to this the engine and pumps were completely overhauled.

BARN BURNED AT BEDEQUE - Fire destroyed the barn of the Presbyterian manse at Bedeque yesterday, razed it to the ground. Although the volunteer fire fighters were in the house, a tractor, automobile, a horse and chickens kept in the barn, they were powerless to save the structure. Rev. D. F. Hodson, Presbyterian minister, said the cause of the fire was a fire from a chicken brooder which was kept in the loft of the barn. There was no insurance to cover the loss.

BIRTHS EXCEED DEATHS IN CITY - The City Health report for the month of March showed that there were no deaths, and only one case of a communicable disease was reported. This was a case of meningitis. There were 803 school children from Boothby Square and Queen Square schools examined in health inspections. The vital statistics show there were 34 births, 11 deaths and no marriages in the City during the month.

POLICE REPORT FOR MARCH - Out of 35 arrests on March 1st there were only 3 dismissals. PLANE TAKES TO AIR - With Pilot, St. J. Jones at the controls the "Laurie" service plane which broke through the Harbour ice and roared over the City at 6:25 a. m. yesterday enroute to Moncton. The plane was on a special trip to Toronto where the plane will be given a complete overhauling. The craft has been hauled a few miles after being damaged by a heavy fog on the 21st. The nose was pointed towards the harbour ice once again and a successful take-off was effected. The surface, frozen over, had been enabled a take-off. The machine was only slightly damaged in the accident.

TEMPERANCE DELEGATION - The Provincial Government yesterday met a delegation of 75 people representing temperance sentiment which inquired whether or not the government planned any change in the Prohibition Act. The delegation asked that the present law remain on the statute book and if the Government felt it was being infringed to make any change, that none be made until a plebiscite is taken. Some of the delegates said there was an impression that a bill would be introduced for the purpose of making a change in the Act with the intention of allowing beer and wine to be sold without a doctor's prescription. In reply, Premier Campbell spoke of his duties in enforcing the Prohibition Act but said the Government would take the representations of the delegation into the most serious consideration. Rogers are members of the Prince Edward Island development and research council which is seeking ways and means to expand the province's industries.
