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Canadiens Third Straight Victory Puts Them Single Point Behind Americans

BOSTON, Jan. 20—Canadiens travelled to New York tonight after giving a demonstration of their old-time form in beating Boston by 4-1 in a National Hockey League game here last night. Over 11,000 people saw the habitués give a display of speed and determination which left the Bruins staggering. It was a bit of a surprise to see the Canadiens' first straight triumph, their earlier victims being the Montreal rivals, the Maroons, and the Toronto Maple Leafs. Canadiens had not defeated the Bruins on Boston ice since 1928.

Barely before have the Bruins appeared so helpless. Little they attempted met with any kind of success and they would have been shut out if Sylvio Mantha had not suffered penalty just at the wrong time in the third period when the Bostonians clicked for their only score.

Little Aurel Joliat, who played a sensational game, the best he has ever turned in on Boston ice, got a pair of tallies for the Canadiens and Goldsworthy accounted for the other two. Each had an unassisted goal.

MARSH, FARRELL DISPUTE LEFT TO GILROY

TORONTO, Jan. 20—Whether or not "Hawse" Marsh and "Red" Farrell are to continue playing with Toronto Consols of the Toronto and York Mercantile League will be left entirely to A. E. Gilroy, President of the Ontario Amateur Hockey Association, W. A. Hewitt, Secretary of the Ontario Hockey Association, said here tonight.

Decision to leave final disposal of the matter to Mr. Gilroy was made at meeting here Saturday, attended by O. H. A. Mercantile League and C. H. A. officials. Mr. Gilroy will also rule on the eligibility of Art Whittaker who returned here from the Maritimes some time before Marsh and Farrell.

Until Mr. Gilroy's decision becomes known, Mr. Hewitt said, the two players will not be used by the Consols. Mercantile League officials maintain Marsh and Farrell are eligible as they signed with Consols Jan. 19, two days before the league's residence rule took effect.

Marsh and Farrell were suspended by the Maritime Hockey Association when they failed to head a C. H. A. edict calling for all players to return to their home branches by Jan. 2.

Marsh and Farrell, members of last year's Hamilton Tigers in the O. H. A., played with Saint John Beavers of the now defunct Maritime Mercantile League until that ago. They moved to Toronto and signed with Consols. The C. H. A. questioned their eligibility and threatened to suspend players competing with or against them.
