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RAILWAY MEN'S WAGES 80 PER CENT OF EARNINGS

D. B. Hanna Explaining Cause of Higher Freight and Passenger Rates Says it Costs the Road More Than a Dollar to Earn a Dollar.

(Dom. Press Special.)
WINNIPEG, Aug. 4.—D. B. Hanna, President of the Canadian National Railways, sought to justify the applications for increases in freight and passenger tariff today, by stating that 80 cents out of every dollar earned by the Canadian National Railways is absorbed in wages, and at the present time it costs the company more than a dollar to earn a dollar.
Mr. Hanna arrived in Winnipeg this morning from the west in company with Hon. J. D. Reid, Minister of Railways and Canals. He has been touring the western lines of the company and reports that the road is in excellent condition. One of the purposes of the trip was to look into the co-ordination of the C. N. railways and G.T.P. In speaking of the application for 30 per cent increase in freight rates at present before the board of Railway Commissioners, Mr. Hanna said that a further increase was imminent to meet the wage award which will likely be made to Canadian employees, but that he was not aware of the amount of the increase to be asked for by the railways.

THE FALL OF WARSAW IS MOMENTARILY EXPECTED

Brest Litovsk Already Occupied and the Victorious Reds are Heading for the Capital. All Negotiations With Bolsheviks at an End. Allies Prepare to Intervene.

PARIS, August 4.—The evacuation of Warsaw is momentarily expected, according to advices to the Foreign Office this afternoon.

Revolution in Poland.

ZURICH, August 4.—Polish revolutionary committee has been formed and has issued a manifesto urging workers to depose the bourgeois government, according to a wireless message from Moscow picked up here today. There is no confirmation from Polish sources.

Krasin Pulling for Germany.

BRUSSELS, August 4.—Gregory Krasin, Bolshevik, in an interview said the terms of peace the Soviet government is offering Poland include right of free transit through Poland to Germany. Krasin is optimistic regarding the possibility of a settlement with England. He said transactions with America are progressing and expressed hope they would develop with Germany.

Allies Will Intervene to Save Warsaw.

LONDON, August 4.—The apparent breakdown of the peace negotiations between the Russians and Poles has aroused the Allied governments to an attempt to make good their promise of military aid to Poland. A supreme effort is to be made to save Warsaw menaced by the advancing Red forces. General Jeygand who is acting as adviser to the Polish general staff is rapidly putting into effect plans of co-operation previously agreed upon.

Last River Crossed.

LONDON, August 4.—Bolshevik troops have crossed the River Bug, the last natural line of defence before Warsaw, according to unofficial dispatches from the Polish capital received here today.

Sinn Feiners Terrorize Merville

More Outrages.

DUBLIN, August 4.—Blindfolded and placarded with letters 'S-F', the body of a man who had been shot was found Tuesday at Clonmore. This was but one of a series of outrages that occurred during the day in widely separated parts of Ireland. The total casualties as far as could be learned were six. Three soldiers were wounded at Holywell when a party of nine troopers guarding a motor lorry were attacked by rebels. Two soldiers were shot near Thurles when the motor lorry in which they were travelling was held up.

Loyalty Cards Introduced.

BELFAST, August 4.—Loyalty cards hearing reputation of Sinn Fein police and declaring loyalty to the King have been introduced. Every Catholic signing them is allowed to work in peace.

PEACE AND PROSPERITY AT LENNOX ISLAND

The Island Indians are Making Splendid Progress in Every Way. Their Loyalty Proved During the Great War.

The Indians of Lennox Island appear to be prospering. The hundreds of people who visited the island on Thursday of last week were noted with pleasure, the fact that the inhabitants are making very satisfactory progress in the primitive camps of other days have given place to neat cottages and these for the most part are very well kept and have garages attached and in some cases are very nicely furnished.

The last census placed the Indian population of Prince Edward Island at 288 of which 200 were settled on the reservation at Lennox Island.

Lennox Island is situated in Richmond Bay and presents a very pretty appearance as viewed from the adjacent shore at Port Hill, from which it is separated by about half a mile of water.

The island which consists of 1,238 acres of land, is three miles long with an average width of half a mile. There are some forty houses on the island with a very pretty church and a school and a hall. The church is situated at the southern end of the island and is a fine picture of the Gothic style. The Rev. J. A. Macdonald, of Grand River Parish attends to the spiritual and to a good many of the other needs of the population and his sympathy and kindly interest in everything pertaining to the welfare of these people, has caused him to be loved and venerated by all. If anyone is in trouble, has a grievance, or needs advice in any way "Father John" as he is affectionately called is sought out and his wise counsel, if followed generally results in a satisfactory adjustment of difficulties. In every good work on the island the hand of Father John is generally discerned somewhere.

The Indians pay more attention to farming today than ever before and the results are beginning to show.

BRITISH MEET TROUBLE IN MESOPOTAMIA

British Column Obligated to Cut its Way Through Body of Hostile Tribesmen But Sustained 300 Casualties and Lost a Gun and Twelve Machine Guns.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—Further troubles for the British in Mesopotamia were reported by the war office today. A strong British column on the lower Euphrates was attacked and roughly handled by tribesmen, it was announced, but succeeded in cutting its way back to Hillah, near the site of ancient Babylon, after sustaining 300 casualties and the loss of one gun and twelve machine guns.

It was stated, if he seeks to visit Ireland, however, he will be halted. Scotland Yard detectives may be assigned to shadow him if necessary to keep him from going to Ireland quietly.
