The school room was nicely decorated for the occasion with ferns, lilies and flowers. The pupils were examined in the different subjects, by the teacher Miss Annie MacAulay also by Miss Mary MacAulay formerly teacher of Ten Mile House. The results were most satisfactory. AGRICULTURAL PICNIC.—The Agricultural Picnic held at Mr. Bruce McKinnon's Orchard, Road, Friday, July 16th was a success in every respect. The day was fine; the place was admirably suited for the purpose; the classes of horses and cattle were all that could be desired; and the attendance of men and women; boys and girls was large. The arrangements were complete. In every respect, and the first Agricultural Picnic held in this section was a credit to the Committee in charge. The judging was done by Prof. Ross, Secretary of Agriculture; W. R. Shaw, District Representative for Queen's County; and W. R. Cook, B. S. A., Director of Agriculture while Mrs. A. E. Dunbrack, Supervisor of Women's Institutes, and Miss McFarlane Assistant Supervisor entertained and instructed the ladies. People began to assemble between one and two o'clock. Addresses were delivered by the various representatives of the Department of Agriculture; by Donald Nicholson, M. P.; Rev. John Murray; James O'Connor, Esq., J. M. Leard, of Kelvin; and Gavin Harding of Graham's Road. Chairman of the meeting was Mr. Thomas Wignam. At 3:45 the first of Live Stock was called. It consisted of Holsteins, Ayrshires and Jerseys. The cattle as a class were excellent. All strong individuals, showing good development of udder-milk veins, barrel, and lung capacity, but, at the same time, everyone of them had some deficiencies, which enabled the instructors to compare the different cows. At 5 o'clock the classes were adjourned for supper, and at 6 o'clock the judging of heavy horses was taken up. This class, again, was made up of particularly good individuals, but at the same time there were several deficiencies, which enabled the instructors to give valuable lessons. The same may be said of the class of Light Horses, at the end of which the meeting was brought to a close. Throughout the gathering there was evidence of the sympathetic co-operation, and everyone who was responsible for the success of this picnic should feel that they were well repaid for their efforts. 
