THE FRUIT GROWERS CONVENTION CLOSES

The Fruit Growers Convention opened yesterday with a demonstration by the Secretary A. E. Dewar and John Robertson.

Richard Burke, Dominion Fruit Inspector read the Dominion Fruit Marks Act of last year and spoke at some length on care and honesty in packing apples.

Senator Ferguson followed emphasizing that it was to the interest of the packers themselves to place only the best fruit in the boxes or barrels.

Prof J. W. Jones of Hillsboro Consolidated School spoke on the Beginning of Horticulture at the Macdonald School and also on the benefits of consolidation.

The election of officers resulted as follows:

President—Rev. A. E. Burke, re-elected, with applause.

Vice President—D. J. Stewart, Aitken's Ferry.

Sec'y-Treas.—A. E. Dewar, Royalty.

Directors for Queen's—John Newson, city; John Johnstone, Long River; George Auld, Covehead.

King's Co.—John Annear, Lower Montague; John Robertson, Inkerman; J. A. Dewar, New Perth.

Prince Co.—A. J. McFadyen, Tignish; C. N. Black, Bedeque, C. R. Dickie, Muddy Creek.

Auditors—Franklyn Boyver and A. W. Starns.

A number of questions from the Question Box were then answered by Prof. Macoun, Senator Ferguson, John Robertson, and John Johnstone. Meeting adjourned till 1.30.

At the afternoon session C. R. Dickie, read an excellent paper on cranberry culture.

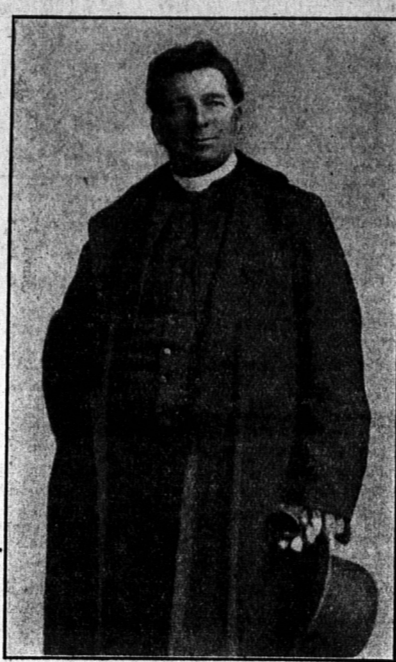
A large number of questions were satisfactorily answered.

Resolutions were passed urging that the government put into operation the provisions of the Black Knot Act; that the Association approve of the Crop Bulletin issued by the Fruit Division, Ottawa; that the Federal Department of Agriculture be asked to undertake the establishment of co-operative fruit packing here as was done in the Dairy Industry; that the resolutions passed at the F. G. A. of Ontario relative of the action of the delegates to

the Ottawa Convention be endorsed; that the Federal Department of Agriculture provide for a permanent system of horticultural education in the province; that the Federal Minister of Agriculture establish a Commission of Agriculture; that the association record the dissatisfaction at the British Market report being received by mail instead of cable; that appreciation be recorded at the services rendered by Robert W. Starr, Wolfville

N. S.; that a provincial enactment should be made to prevent the spread of the San Jose scale; that the need of a skilled horticulturist at the stock farm and to superintend the model orchards in the country districts be urged on the Local Government; that the one barrel measure adopted by the Nova Scotia Convention be endorsed.

After consideration of other questions etc. the convention closed by singing the National Anthem.

THE NEW STATION AT KENSINGTON

Continued from page 1

The new Railway Station at Kensington which was formally opened last evening is located a few feet east of the old building.

This station is by far the finest on the road at present, being built of grey field stone. These stones were procured in the western portion of the Island and are placed in the wall of the building in their natural shape bedded in cement which makes a very substantial wall.

The building has a frontage of sixty-eight feet and a width of twenty-six feet. At the ends are two detached piers which support a roof that is continued from the main roof thus forming a shelter from either the rays of the sunshine or fall of rain. The end gables are also a large gable on the front of the building are finished with pebble dash cement plaster being divided into panels which adds much to the appearance of the building.

The gentlemen's waiting room is in the east end and is full width of the building and twenty feet long. This waiting room is connected with the ladies' by a passage way fifteen feet long and seven feet wide.

The ladies' waiting room is also full width of the building and fifteen feet long. The office is placed between the waiting rooms, having the ticket wicket in the passage way which is very convenient.

The waiting rooms and office walls and ceilings are sheathed and neatly paneled, the office in North Carolina pine and ash and the waiting rooms in ash, all finished in the natural wood.

There are large entrance doors both on the track and rear elevations leading to each waiting room.

A baggage room is placed in the west end fourteen by twenty three feet. There are also two toilet rooms in the rear of the building connected with the waiting rooms.

The floors throughout are of hard wood and everything throughout the building is of the best material and workmanship.

The building is heated with hot water having a suitable number of radiators in office and waiting rooms. This magnificent structure which has been admired during the summer by all was built by M. F. Schurman & Co. under the supervision of their foreman A. E. Baker.

This firm has been notified within the last few days that the contract for building a freight shed 22 x 90 ft has also been awarded them. This will be built a short distance west of the new station and will add greatly to shipping accommodations.

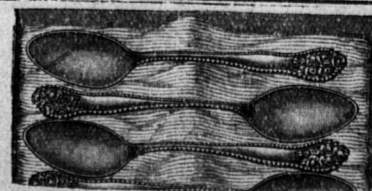
