MRS. DUNCAN MACLEOD

The community of Hartsville lost one of its oldest and most respected residents in the passing of the late Mrs. Duncan MacLeod on Wednesday, April 22nd at her home.

The late Mrs. MacLeod was born at Belle River in May 1851, the youngest daughter of John MacLean and his wife, nee Catherine Gillis. In 1881 she came to Hartsville as the wife of the late Duncan MacLeod who predeceased her nineteen years ago. Early in life she became a member of Wood Islands Presbyterian Church where she was for many years a Sabbath School teacher.

On moving to Hartsville she transferred her membership to the Presbyterian Church there and remained a valued member until the time of her death. In the community she was always ready to help others in time of need or trouble.

The deceased was for several years confined to her bed and from her illness with Christian fortitude and faith in the redeeming power of her Saviour. During those years she was always remembered both by her children and grandchildren and cared for by her daughter-in-law.

There are left to mourn the loss of a kind and Christian mother three daughters, namely: Christine, Mrs. Wallace F. MacLeod, Brighton, Mass.; Belle, Mrs. J. W. Locke, Arlington, Mass.; Annie, Mrs. W. J. Bailey, Dorchester, Mass., and three sons: Col. Allan MacLeod, at home; Staff Sergeant Major J. A. MacLeod with the R. C. O. C. stationed at Halifax; Rev. R. A. MacLeod, M. A., B. D., F.R.C.S. (Eng.) First Congregational Church, Haddam, Conn. One daughter, Margaret, predeceased her. There are also left

to mourn, a number of grand children. The funeral service was held on Thursday, April 23rd at 2 p. m. and conducted by her pastor, Dr. A. O. Thomson, D.D., who frequently visited her during her illness. His address was beautifully expressed and very appropriate.

Considering the unfavorable condition of the roads, the funeral service was largely attended. The pallbearers were: Messrs. Borden MacLennan, Lloyd Nicholson, Leslie Nicholson, and her three grandsons, John, Ira and Oliver MacLeod. Interment was in Hartsville Cemetery.
