Movements in the dairy produce lines of the Montreal market on the 5th inst., were as follows:—The demand for butter, according to a local jobber, has slackened off of late on account of the high prices that the consumer has to pay for supplies. If this is so to any considerable extent, the stocks that are held here will be eked out a little longer and there may not be any further increase in prices. Today's quotations are 30c to 31c per pound for all creamery in jobbing lots and single packages bring 32c in some cases. Winter made creamery is quoted at 28c to 29c, and dairy rolls at 26c to 27c per pound. Cheese values are steady at 13c to 13 1/2c per pound, according to quality, and a moderate trade is being worked.

The social meeting of Excelsior Farmers' Institute in York Hall, Friday evening was an unqualified success. There were present from the city, Prem. Hazard, Hon. S. E. Reid, Prof. Ross and Rev. Mr. Hawley from Marshall and Rev. P. Dawson, York. The tables literally groined beneath the good things so amply provided by the ladies, and after the wants of the inner man were duly satisfied, Prem. Hazard expressed the greatest pleasure at being present at such a meeting. Agriculture was the mainstay of this province and the Farmers' Institutes should receive all possible encouragement. As a result of the seed fairs many farmers in the neighboring provinces are receiving a high price for their grain. He thought practical farmers should lecture of certain subjects before the different Institutes. Hon. S. E. Reid thought the antiquated system of farming should go, and dairying under improved methods and conditions should be adopted, thus increasing the fertility of the soil. The use of good seed also would greatly benefit the farmer, resulting, as it often does in an increase of 16 bushels to the acre. Rev. Mr. Hawley was surprised at the large amount of grain produced in this small province and thought the farmer's lot compared favorably with that of others. Rev. G. F. Dawson congratulated the Institute on the large attendance the excellence of the menu provided and thought much good must result from such meetings in the future. On mention of George Vesey a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the ladies and the different speakers to which they suitably responded, after which the meeting closed with the National Anthem.

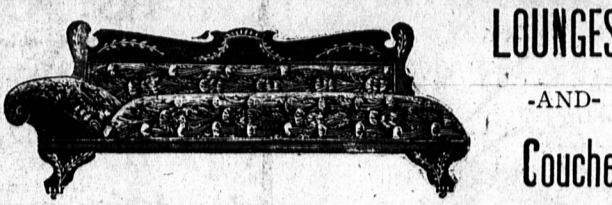
