TORONTO, Jan. 23.—Engineer Sawley White, of Prescott, was killed and nearly a score of persons injured yesterday, when the C.P.R. train from Prescott to Ottawa plunged over an embankment near Chandlere Jet, about two miles from this city. The engine was scalded to death after being derailed under the locomotive.

SERBIA IS NEXT PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—The problem of Serbia is the only topic on the agenda of the Washington Conference now remaining to be discussed, and is to replace the Chinese questions during the coming week as of paramount concern to Arms delegates. The Japanese reception today from Tokyo, expression of policy by the Foreign Minister Uchida, which they regarded as determining definitely the attitude of their government against the withdrawal of Japanese troops from Siberia until stable administration has been established there.

DEMAND RESIGNATION

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—A resolution demanding the resignation of Mr. Carvell, chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, by reason of the alleged recent utterance to the effect that railway workers had to be followed with a yard stick, is being forwarded to the Prime Minister by the executive of the Allied Trades and Labor Council. This was announced at a meeting of the Trade and Labor Council on Saturday night.

Complication In Liquor Case

ST. JOHN, Jan. 23.—The first liquor complication since the province went "bone dry" on Jan. 18 arose yesterday in connection with the arrival of the steamer Lisgar County from London and Havre with cases of liquor on board for local delivery. Since all importation was stopped on Wednesday last this liquor cannot be delivered legally to its consignee who is a local wholesale liquor dealer. On the other hand the customs regulations require that it be landed. No solution for this difficulty has yet been reached.

The customs authorities said yesterday afternoon that under the new law the liquor would be liable to seizure by them as soon as it was landed and that this would be done unless a written permit was secured from the chief liquor inspector allowing its entry. One of the customs officials said that the only liquor which could be imported now was that consigned to the New Brunswick board of liquor vendors. If this liquor appeared in the manifests as consigned to this city it would have to be landed here from the steamer, the official added.

Thomas Nagle, of the firm of Nagle and Wigmore, local agents of the steamer Lisgar County, which has this liquor on board, said yesterday afternoon that the matter of getting the liquor to its consignee was not up to them. The steamer only brought it here as contracted and placed it on the wharf and its final disposition was strictly up to its owner; that the company's responsibility ceased when the goods were landed.

As soon as the liquor is landed it is expected that the arrangements will commence between the consignee and the customs authorities. It was held today that the fact that the liquor was en route here before the law was enacted would not affect its liability to be landed.
