WELL-KNOWN CAPTAIN DIES IN AUSTRIA

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Sept. 9 (CP)—The ashes of a mariner well-known on the Canadian West Coast, Captain William Martin, have at his own request been scattered at sea over the wreck of his old ship, the liner Niagara.

As one of the senior captains of the Canadian-Australian Line, Captain Martin made many voyages between Vancouver and Australia and New Zealand in the Niagara and other vessels of the line. He was in command of the Niagara when in 1940 she struck a German mine off the New Zealand coast while en route from Auckland to Vancouver.

CLEARING FARM LAND OF TREE STUMPS

From the farmer's point of view, the methods of removal of tree stumps will depend on the general object in view, because stump removal may be considered from three different aspects, namely: green stumps, dead stumps, and decayed stumps. If the land to be cleared is required immediately, stumps are normally removed in the summer, following timbering operations. This is the most expensive procedure and will involve the use of heavy equip-

ment, if the work is to be done quickly.

Where the amount of land under cultivation is being only gradually extended, the usual procedure is to seed down the stump land and pasture it for a few years to kill off the stump shoots and allow the stumps to die. Dead stumps can be more easily removed than green ones. Where time is not a factor, stumps may be allowed to decay. In this condition they can be readily removed with a minimum of labour and equipment.

The work and expense involved in removing green stumps should not be underestimated. The method selected will, of course, depend on the size of the stump, the acreage to be cleared, and the time, labour and equipment available. Hand grubbing is very laborious and can be done only if a few stumps are to be removed. A team cannot pull more than about a 4-inch jack pine or spruce stump on a straight draw. Where the acreage to be cleared is small, heavy charges of dynamite can be used economically in removing scattered green stumps. Otherwise, on extensive land clearing projects, tractor bulldozers will have to be used, but owing to high initial cost, this equipment must be operated on large acreages to be economical.

However, full information of every phase of land clearing of timber and brush, stump removal of all kinds, power machinery required, blasting, stone and hummock removal, and preparing cleared land for field crop production together with estimated costs, will be found in the illustrated publication "Land Clearing" by P. O. Ripley, Dominion Field Husbandry Division, Experimental Farm Service. A copy of the publication may be obtained by writing to the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
