**SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS**

August 1, 1915.

THE KINGDOM TORN ASUNDER.

I. King 12:1-24.

GOLDEN TEXT.

"Pride goeth before destruction and a haughty spirit before a fall,"—Prov. 16:18.

Verses 1-5. Disaffection must have been brewing in the later years of Solomon's reign; for the crisis seems to have come immediately upon the occasion of his successor's coronation. The gathering of the representatives of the people for this purpose took place at Shechem. The place had served as an assembling ground for Israel on previous occasions, as under Joshua (Josh. 24:33-35; 24:1). It was conveniently located thirty miles north of Jerusalem within the territory of Ephraim, and adjoining that of Manasseh. The critics of Solomon's regime had evidently come prepared for all contingencies. They had chosen their leader in the person of Jeroboam, the son of Nebat, a dashing young military leader who had rebelled against Solomon, and on being worsted, fled into Egypt for his life. They recalled him from his self-banishment, and made him their spokesman. When Rehoboam appeared at Shechem he found himself face to face with a strong delegation of the northern tribes, headed by Jeroboam. They put a simple and respectful petition before him. There was no threat or alternative in case he did not accede to it. It was a request for the lightening of their burdens. "Thy father made our yoke grievous; now therefore make thou the grievous service of thy father, and his heavy yoke that he put upon us, lighter, and we will serve thee," Rehoboam asked for time to consider the request.

Verses 6, 7. Rehoboam felt the need for advice in the case before him. To be open to advice is a good thing in a young man whether he be a king, a student or an employee. It is natural too in taking advice to go to the aged. Their experience should be a guide. They are a source of wisdom. They speak out of a knowledge which covers large and varied range of facts. This is true, of course, only of the aged who have profited by their experience; for age mere age is not always a sign of wisdom. The old men consulted by Rehoboam in his perplexity had been associated with Solomon in his administration. They had watched perhaps with solicitude the developments of his policy, and come to understand that the burden of taxation had grown quite heavy for the people. Their advice to Rehoboam was given in the form of an ideal monarchy. They urged him to be a servant to the people. They set forth the same principle as Jesus did when he told his disciples "whoever would become great among you shall be your servant." The king who forgets this principle misses his opportunity. It was sound and wholesome advice.

Verses 8-11. But Rehoboam ostensibly sought to act upon a wrong impression of opinion as possible. In the multitude of counsellors there is safety. The experience of the old men is very good. But the old are apt to be over cautious. There is something to be learned also from the daring and fresh approach to perplexing situations peculiar to the young. Rehoboam called for the young men. Their advice was diametrically the opposite of that of the old. They held up to him a totally different ideal of monarchy. Against the German claims of kingship must rule. His safety lay in his strong hand. If he began to heed the criticisms and complaints of his subjects he would presently find himself a mere puppet in the hands of demagogues. He must firmly renege the petition of the delegation of the northern tribes. He must threaten to increase the burden of the people, no doubt as a means towards the nipping in the bud any tendencies towards anarchy among them.

Verses 12-15. Rehoboam made his choice as between the ideals of royalty presented to him. His choice was no doubt determined by his own youthful preference for dash and vigor. But it was a foolish choice. The two ideals are ideals not merely of present advantage, but of leadership, royalty, but of all leadership. He who looks upon office or position as a means of wielding power or securing promotion for himself makes a lamentable mistake. Leadership must be controlled by the motive of service to those who are led if it shall be successful leadership.

Verses 16-20. When the people of the northern tribes realized that there was no hope of readiness for their grievances they did what Rehoboam and the "young party" did not anticipate—they rebelled against him and chose the natural leader, Jeroboam, to be the kind of a separate kingdom. The division was deplorable. Israel was not a larger nation even when all the tribes united under the Babylonian, Assyrian and the Egyptian people, it was almost insignificant. The tribes could ill-afford to be acting separately in their struggles to keep independent of Assyro-Babylonian or Egyptian dominations. Far less could they hope to succeed if they acted as two kingdoms at enmity with one another. And yet this was the inevitable goal to which the disruption must lead.

Verses 21-24. After the murderer of Adoram, whom Rehoboam sent to bring the rebels back to his allegiance, there was nothing left but for him to return to Jerusalem and hold together as best he could the regions over the fragment of the kingdom of David and Solomon which still acknowledged him as king. He did indeed think of regaining what he had lost. He prepared for a war of conquest. But the better counsel of the prophet Shemaiah prevailed against this plan. The people of the ten tribes and that of Judah and Benjamin were brethren. A war between them on part of Rehoboam must add to the guilt of his folly in alienating the northern tribes, that of a fratricidal struggle. And the prophetic narrative sees in all this unfortunate affair the hand of the God of Israel. Jehovah said, "for this thing is of me."

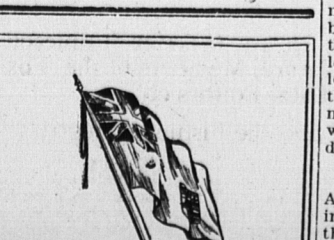

**SAYS RUSSIA IS UNCONQUERABLE**

BOSTON, June 27.—"When the allies have come out on top, as I believe is inevitable," said Thomas W. Pelham, sales manager of the Gillette Safety Razor Company at his home, 51 Winthrop Road, Brookline, whether he had returned from Mrs. Pelham, after a careful study in May and June of War Conditions in Russia. "Russia will become the mecca of America enterprise, in a word, Russia is the coming America."

"It will be our opportunity to create an invincible commercial relationship and structure for all—not from the angle of a bystander striving to profit rather meanly from another's country's discomfiture, but from an entirely different angle. Russia has wonderful possibilities. Out of the horror of this war, good will come. It is in every sense a popular war. The rulers are softened toward the people. The people are just ready for education and advancement."

"Things haven't fairly begun yet. Russia, when the Allies decide the time is come to strike the end of the Fall, it may not be till next spring, it may not come till the end of 1916; but it will come—will know not only her military, but her commercial strength."

**War As An Educator**

"The country is about ready for free schools. More of a democratic government will follow the end of the war. The peasant is taught to read and write in the centres before going to the messuams and the art galleries and the goodness of his country, and a worth while patriotism is developed. If he is so unfortunate to be wounded he receives an even greater and more systematic education."

"I want you to understand there is ceasing to be such a thing as 'Darkest Russia. There is a hardy guarding every ten feet of track as a precaution against assassination of the Czar. Members of the Royal family are seen driving about without even a special escort. There is getting to be in Russia just a freedom of the individual as in America. Russia will emerge from the war with considerably more knowledge and a desire for more."

"The country is a tremendous consumer. The feeling is most friendly toward America and American products. The work of inducing Russia to become an American customer may be a little slow, but finally it will be done and will be for all time."

"Today is the time for us to begin learning the language. There is a tremendous market. Russia is a barren of merchandise because she is so difficult of access. Germany has bottled up the Baltic, just as England has bottled up the inlet and the outlet of the Baltic for Russia. If Constantinople falls there would be a very different story."

**Strategy of Czar's Campaign**

"Formerly Russia was not a good credit. Now she is buying for cash despite the unfair rate of exchange. 'When the language is learned by our exporters of all kinds, the time for operators to commence is when Germany has lost her market and lost her prestige. 'American enterprise and executive ability combined with English long-headedness and money, can go in there and build up a positively wonderful commercial machine. Russia herself has the men and tools to do it. Questioned about the foundation of the Kaiser's somewhat boastful telegram to his sister, the Queen of Greece, as to Russia's being paralyzed in there and about the official reports from Berlin regarding the steady and consistent Russian reverses, Mr. Pelham said: 'That is all part of the preconceived Russian plan. It is Russia's part in the whole general plan to retreat a little, to make a stand, then to retreat again, and so on. 'Russia's military difficulty now is lack of ammunition. But she has a tremendous amount of it ordered, with armament from America and from Japan. That will begin to arrive toward the end of August. Then you will see something happen in the nature of the finish, providing a means is found of overcoming the present great difficulty encountered in the distribution of freight reaching the frontier."

**Russia Unconquerable**

"But now Russia has not enough ammunition to risk all in one battle. Consequently, she keeps on retreating. Why, if Russia had had ammunition at the start she would now have been in Berlin. 'When Russia got across the Carpathians her aim was to spread over the plains of Hungary where her Cossacks could have been turned. The idea was that Bulgaria and Rumania could be made to come in not so much for the actual strength

**HOW THE GERMANS REGARD THE KAISER**

BERLIN, July 27.—The Kaiser will go down in history as William the Great. If the events of the first year of the war appeal so vividly to the imaginations of future Germans as they do to the generation that is living through the present world conflict, Frederick the Great held Europe at bay, and saved Prussia through seven years of strife. His descendant, who now holds the Hohenzollern throne, has more than equalled Frederick's task, because Frederick had England with him, and there was then no United States to furnish Germany's enemies with munitions. Nobody expects the present conflict to run seven years, but that the Kaiser can stand a war of that duration, so can Germany with the Kaiser at the head of affairs, the Germans claim. When the war started the Emperor William had fallen into disfavour with many of his people for a number of reasons. Some believed he was too autocratic, others thought he was too well disposed toward the English, and still others thought he was afraid of the military machine Germany had developed and was too prejudiced in favor of peace at any price ever to permit the Kaiser to test himself. The early days of the war, when enemy after enemy took the field against Germany, people talked disparagingly of the Emperor, as an incompetent, who had played his cards badly and had overestimated Germany's strength.

**Has Immense Orders Placed**

"Russia's tool for the 'finish' is ordered. There are 12,000,000 rifles coming from America; also \$60,000,000 worth of ammunition. And \$60,000,000 worth of freight cars for distributing the tools are coming from America. 'Germans have said to me, 'You Americans are not neutral. You sympathize with the Allies and furnish them arms.' I replied: 'I will contract to send arms to you. I will get them.' But obviously there was no reply to that with England in control of the seas."

**Turkey's Entry a Mistake**

"Germany made a grievous mistake in egging Turkey into the war. For in so doing she was simply playing into Russia's hands and furnishing her with the possibility of a return for this change of front. The gain Germany could hope for through Turkey was a possible finger in the control of the Suez canal. 'The case of Russia we have practically disposed of and the probable outcome, I would insert this in the event of any one thinking the recent Russian reverses ominous. 'When I left Russia June 14, the Russians said: 'We may lose Przemysl. We may lose other places. But that is only temporary. Wait till we have been supplied with ammunition. Mr. Pelham went from Russia to Copenhagen, thence to Bergen, Norway, then to Newcastle, England, then to London, to Leicester, a manufacturing centre of the safety razor, and from Liverpool, back to Leicester and from Liverpool, he sailed on the American New York, reaching New York Sunday night. The New York was not molested by submarines, though a passenger in a pull packet, carrying no cargo in which he was crossing the English Channel, was chased by a submarine, which came within half a mile. 'England,' he finished last night, 'is simply sitting tight.' She has 3,000,000 men waiting under arms. France has 3,500,000. Together they await grimly a proper moment. When they think a suitable time will come they will descend. And Russia's fortunes will be in the ascendancy then. 'There can be only one end."

**DEFEAT OF TURKS IN ASIATIC TURKEY**

(Special to The Guardian)  
LONDON, July 29.—(Official)—A communication to-night says General Sir John Nixon reported that as a result of the action of 24 July, near Nasriyeh, Asiatic Turkey, the disorganized Turkish forces retreated northward more than 25 miles. The enemies' casualties in killed, wounded or prisoners amounted approximately to 2,500 men, including 400 officers and 600 men, of whom 200 were wounded. Our captures of arms and material include one 40-pounder gun, twelve field and two mountain guns, several machine guns and 1,000 rounds of artillery, 300,000 rounds of small arms ammunition, explosive bombs and other miscellaneous stores. Our casualties numbered 564 men.

**BERLIN DESPATCH LOCATES BRITISH SHIPS**

(Special to The Guardian)  
BERLIN, July 29.—By wireless to Savigny included in the news given out to-day by the Overseas News Agency is the following: A correspondent at Athens of Vossische Zeitung reports that the British super-dreadnought, Lion, has arrived in the harbor of Mudros, on the Lemnos Island. The Aquitania and Mauritania are being used as troop transports also in this harbor. "The Lion," the correspondent goes on to say, "received serious injuries in the naval engagement last January off the Doggerbank in the North Sea. She has been sent to join the Dardanelles fleet. The British Agamemnon was badly damaged and is also lying in Mudros harbor." The Lion, according to previous reports, took part in the naval battle in the North Sea on the 24th January. It was said at the time that she had been disabled. Later these reports were denied by the British Admiralty. The Agamemnon would appear to have been active at the Dardanelles fighting in February of this year. In March she was damaged by Turkish fire from the land

**WITHIN THEIR LEGAL RIGHTS.**

WASHINGTON, July 28.—No interference by the State Department is contemplated in the various cases now before the Department of Justice, where foreign subjects have been indicted under the foreign enlistment act, for alleged aid to their countrymen homeward bound, for military service. This was the impression conveyed to the Russian ambassador to-day, during an unexpected call at the department regarding Montenegro agents, under arrest on such charges at Chicago and Seattle. He was told that as the Department of Justice already had started proceeding nothing could be done until the courts had passed on the questions involved. The Russian embassy is caring for Montenegrin interests here, in the absence of a minister from Montenegro. A similar reply was made recently to the British ambassador, who inquired as to the status of British subjects indicted under the act. The embassy had advised those persons that they were within their legal rights. It is regarded as certain that diplomatic protests will follow convictions in these cases. The British view is that the act prohibits only the hiring of persons in this country for service in a foreign army. In other quarters it is argued that the prevention of the enlistment of American citizens in foreign armies was what the act sought to accomplish, and that it did not apply to foreigners, resident in the United States.
