MOTHER MISTRUSTS GIRL Parent Errs In Doubting Good Faith And Veracity Of Offspring

DEAR MISS DIX: My boy friend, who is a sailor, is home on a short furlough. The other night we went out together and had a flat tire and didn't get in until late. Not very late at that. I told my mother just exactly what happened, but she doesn't believe me and has forbidden me to see him any more.

This boy and I have known each other for over three years and we love each other. He will be leaving soon, going back to his duty, and I may never see him again, so this may be the end. If anything should happen to him, I will hate my mother as long as I live.

I have never done anything in my life that is wrong. Why should my mother fail to trust me? X. X. X.

MISTRUST IS INJURIOUS

ANSWER: I get many letters from girls who tell me that their mothers don't trust them and accuse them of doing things that they never dreamed of doing. It cuts these youngsters to the quick to know that their mothers have so little faith in them. And as I read these pitiful little missives that are often tear-stained, I wonder that any grownup woman should have so little knowledge of human nature as not to know that the strongest hold that she can have upon her children is for them to feel that she trusts them.

For that puts them upon their honor. It makes them responsible for what they do. Parents can't go with their children wherever they go. They can't watch them all the time, so spying on them does no good. But if the boys and girls know that Mom and Pop trust them to behave themselves decently, it is not often that they fail to do so. They won't let them down.

A child feels just as much insulted by being called a liar as a grownup does, and parents make a great mistake in accusing one of not being truthful unless they have absolute knowledge that he or she is telling a falsehood. Even then it is better to try to build up in the youngster's mind an ideal of the honor and respect that goes to the person whose word is his bond than it is to punish him for not being trustworthy. And the same applies to girls. There is no way to keep a girl good like making her believe that you think her incapable of not living up to your ideal of her.

The questions are those which have reached the Wartime Prices and Trade Board from housewives in this district. The answers are provided by the Board's Reader. Persons who have intelligent questions to ask on price control are invited to send them in writing to the Women's Regional Advisory Committee.

Q. When my son went overseas, I turned the third floor of my house into a flat for my daughter-in-law and her baby. Later my daughter-in-law had to move to another city. I rented the flat to another family, but now my son has returned from overseas and I want him and his family to have the accommodation. How much notice do I have to give the present tenants?

A. If your son receives a discharge from the service, you need give only three months' notice to the present tenants.

Q. I am a farmer and want to slaughter some cattle for my own consumption. Do I have to get a slaughter permit?

A. No, if you and your family are going to consume the meat you do not require a permit. Any portion of your meat, not required for consumption in your household, can be sold only to anyone who holds a slaughterer's permit in a piece not less than a quarter of a carcass, or to a neighboring farmer.

COOK'S CORNER

ONION MUSTARD PICKLES
4 quarts small white onions
4 sweet peppers
1/2 cup salt
4 quarts boiling water
4 tablespoons dry mustard
1 tablespoon turmeric
10 tablespoons flour
3 cups sugar
4 cups vinegar

Method: Drop onions into boiling water, drain and peel. Remove seeds and white membranes from the peppers. Combine the onions and the red sweet peppers for this, if you can obtain them. Chop the peppers finely, either in a food chopper or by hand. If red peppers are not available, and you wish to have the color, canned pimientos may be used.

Now make the mustard sauce. Combine the mustard, turmeric, flour and sugar with the way you drain the onions and the red peppers to the paste and heat, stirring constantly, until it reaches the boiling point. Now add the water, drained onions and peppers (or canned pimientos), and let simmer in the sauce for 10 minutes. Add the mixture in hot, sterilized jars. Cool and store in a cool, dry place.
