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RELIGIOUS SERVICES

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

The annual meeting of this Church was held on Wednesday night last and yesterday morning Rev. Hugh Miller not only expressed his personal gratification at the results achieved, but after an experience of five months residence here the ministers wished to compliment most heartily the leaders, officers, workers and people on their zeal and loyalty and looked forward to a happy co-operation in the development of the spiritual life of our work.

"Capturing Youth." It is necessary and it is possible so declared Rev. Hugh Miller as he addressed a large representation of the C.G.T. who were seated in the front pews of the centre section at the morning worship. Mr. Miller's text was Psalm 144-12, "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth, that our daughters may be as corner stones polished after the similitude of a palace." A nation must capture its youth or perish. The Church must capture its youth. What should make a greater challenge to youth than the Church? "If the youth are to go straight, think straight, live straight, in other words, if they are to be captured for Christ we must lead and issue the challenge." The present is one of the times when to be indifferent is almost unpardonable. How are we preparing youth to take their places. As a word to youth Mr. Miller said my first word would be a willingness to learn, listen to a word, accept responsibility. Give to you this day whom you will serve and serve Him. Be loyal to Christ and His Church. Be loyal to your society and your leaders. Give to others what others have given to you. You can thus build a better world and you cannot fail if you act under the leadership of Christ.

At night Rev. Mr. Miller spoke from the text Matt. 5-20, "Except your righteousness exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees ye shall in no case enter into the kingdom of heaven." We must have more than a mere formality in religion. There must be the new birth, for birth in every case means the death of the old. The service of praise included an anthem both morning and evening and in addition Miss Doris Tait gave a finely rendered solo at the morning worship. Mrs. W. C. Spencer was the soloist at night.

Interest in the Sunday School is increasing, the attendance now averages about 480.

HOLY REDEEMER CHURCH

Sermons were preached at all the Masses yesterday morning by the Rev. Father Fleming, his text being, "Ye first the Kingdom of Heaven." "Catholic Action" was best practiced individually, by receiving Holy Communion frequently and making careful and good preparation before receiving Holy Communion. He also emphasized the necessity of spending some time in meditation after having received Holy Communion. In this way, he assured his congregation, we would gain for ourselves the Kingdom of Heaven, and by our example and prayers, be an influence for good, and be the means of others gaining the Kingdom of Heaven also. The Married Women of the Archconfraternity of the Holy Family received Holy Communion in a body at the 7.30 Mass. The children's Mass was at 9 o'clock, and High Mass was celebrated at 10.30 by Rev. Father Johnston. The mixed choir rendered Yon's Mass very creditably. Sunday School was held for all the children in the afternoon.

Services in the evening were in honor of Our Mother of Perpetual Help. Last September, a novena of Sundays was started in preparation for the Feast of Our Mother of Perpetual Help. The novena Sundays being the first Sunday of each month. The sermons preached at these novena services are on the art of the miraculous picture of Our Mother of Perpetual Help. Last evening, Rev. Father Fleming preached an eloquent and impressive sermon, in which he explained the artist's purpose for including in the picture, the instruments of the Passion to the Child Jesus. Who is shown in the arms of His Mother, fearfully clinging to her, as if seeking her motherly protection. Father Fleming also read a list of petitions which had been placed at the shrine to be prayed for and also four thanksgivings for favors, which had been placed at the shrine since last Tuesday. He told the congregation that since beginning the regular Tuesday evening services in honor of Our Mother of Perpetual Help last June, one hundred and seventy written testimonials of favors received had been recorded, and as Tuesday, he presented that while kneeling in prayer to Our Mother of Perpetual Help at these services, thousands of others were doing likewise throughout Canada, United States and Europe. The services were concluded with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, given by Father Fleming.

Yesterday being the Feast of St. Blaise, the blessing of throats took place after the Masses in the morning, in the afternoon and again in the evening after the service.
