OFFICIAL EXTORTION.

As long as the winter steamers are plying again between this port and Pictou. We are told for this piece of transient good fortune we are indebted to Messrs Warburton and Prowse, who sent an urgent telegram to Ottawa on Friday last demanding the restoration. We give all credit to those gentlemen for their interest in the trade of the port and for the influence they thus wielded at headquarters. The incident accentuates the necessity for local control of the winter steamers. Until such control is secured there will be trouble constantly arising. For the moment the steamers are here, but our people know that they are liable to be ordered away or taken away again at the mere motion of one of the captains, without an hour's notice. Such conditions are simply ruinous to trade.

It is sufficiently apparent that any kind of an ice-breaking steamer worthy of the name could have kept up communication between this port and Pictou ever since the Steam Navigation Company's boats stopped running. The direct route for interprovincial trade was abandoned for no better reasons, apparently, than the convenience of the captains or the chance it would give to practice extortion upon our shippers and importers. By forcing all the traffic round by Georgetown thousands of dollars are extorted in the winter months by the Government from those doing business in this city, Summerside, Alberton, Tignish and other sections of the Province. Why should our people be asked or expected to submit to such unjust exactions? It becomes clear that because we have submitted in the past it is expected we will forever submit to be held white in this way.

A talk with Charlottetown shippers and business men, in part reported in another column of this issue of The Guardian, gives a glimpse of what has been suffered in the past and their resolve to have better conditions in the future or know the reason why. We remember a time when Sir Wilfrid Laurier in Parliament dramatically pictured the woes of the North west Half-breeds and the delay of justice which in that instance he charged upon the Government of the day. "Too late! too late!" were his mournful words on that occasion, and yet the wrongs of the Metis were by no means half so bad as the hard conditions which the white people of this Province are every winter called upon to endure. Sir Wilfrid expressed his willingness to take up arms in behalf of the Half-breeds had he been resident in their country. It is his own Government which practices this oppression and exaction upon us.

The Government at Ottawa cannot plead ignorance of the conditions existing here. They heard the people's delegation two years ago and also the delegation from the Provincial Government presenting the unanimous memorial of the Legislature. They met us with promises then, but the promise of another steamer and other improved trade conditions was not kept. The Government has been for weeks past extorting ten to twenty dollars per car load on all the outward and inward freight of this entire Province, and a proportionate exaction from every passenger coming and going. The pretext has been that the winter steamers could not come here when schooners could come and go as will. What is this but barefaced official robbery? Surely the Half-breeds were treated better than this!

FATHER BURKE'S TIME TABLE.

The time table proposed by Father Burke in his letter printed in The Guardian of Saturday is in the main a good one, if the Government will grant the additional passenger trains west. For the through passenger business between the far west and Charlottetown it is about as good as anything that can be devised with the limited train mileage to which the partial economy of the Government restricts us. We say partial economy advisedly, for with the cutting down of expenses here we are forced to witness more and more lavish expenditures in the west every year.

The weak point in Father Burke's table is in skipping the service between Charlottetown and Summerside, the two principal business centres of the Province, and between which points there is the greatest traffic. It is important for the business interests of those two centres and for the country surrounding them and lying between, that every facility shall be given those along the line to reach one or both of these towns, have ample time to transact business and return home the same day.

No doubt it was by inadvertence, or of necessity, and not with any desire to discriminate against Summerside that Father Burke shaped his schedule as he did. We do not think it quite fair to the western capital, as on three days of the week it would be impossible for persons east of Summerside to reach that town by rail and return the same day. We are desirous to get fair play for Charlottetown but we do not wish to get it by imposing any disadvantage upon our Summerside friends.

Father Burke has made a good table as far as it goes, and the plan should be held in mind when the winter tables are rearranged hereafter. It leaves something to be desired, however. By some means an additional service outward from Charlottetown on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings and inward from Summerside to Charlottetown on Monday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons should be supplied, alike in the interest of these two centres. Father Burke has made an improved table for west Prince, but somewhat at the expense of the larger towns and the country between them.

We beg to remind the Railway Department that the additional train between Summerside and Charlottetown has not yet been put on to enable persons along this route to have time enough to do business in this city and return the same day nor has the Cape Traverse train been run to this city as an express pending the above change, but lies idle at Emerald. Every day until this is done the business houses and hotels in this city are being unfairly and unjustly dealt with.

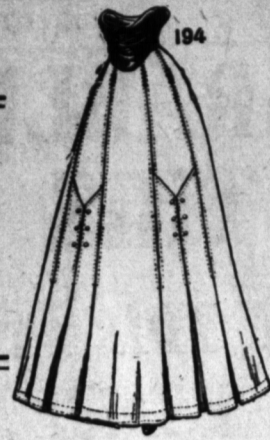

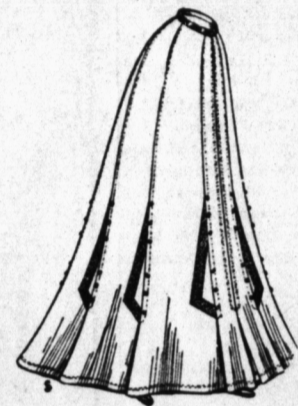
