Splendid Showing of Sussex Cheese
and Butter Co.—Probably the
Largest Butter Factory in
All Canada.

It is a well recognized fact that the
development of the dairy industry in and
around Sussex shows what enterprise on
the part of a progressive people will do.
Very few are aware of the unexampled
progress that has and is taking place in
the dairy industry in the Sussex district
during the last half dozen years.

Those who attended the annual meet-
ing of the Sussex Cheese & Butter Co.,
on Tuesday, an account of which is given
below, could not fail to see the grand
results that have come to the people of
this district through the development of
this industry.

The gain in business at the factory dur-
ing the year, was rather more than 33
per cent over 1902.

an idea of the amount of business done
during the year and a comparison with

It must also be remembered when re-
ferring to the price of milk which is paid
at 80 cents, that there should be added
to this at least 14 cents for skim milk that
is returned. By taking this into account
the actual value of the milk was \$1.00 per
hundred lbs.

With this splendid showing the Sussex
factory reaches very near the top in the
matter of output of butter from Canadian
creameries. The yearly statements from
other parts of the Dominion have not as
yet come to hand, but in comparison
with last year's statements from other
places, we would put Sussex factory down
as one of the largest if not the largest in
all Canada.—Kings County Record.
