Sanitary conditions in the town. Dr. Tanton considered, were not serious but were serious enough to warrant a united effort on the part of the authorities to try and improve them.

For some time past an endeavor had been made to establish a health centre for Prince County at Summerside, which, with the co-operation of the local doctors and police, would be able to deal with these matters in an impartial way. To compell a poor man to put water in his house would be arbitrary, he considered, and it is rather a difficult thing to put people out of a home because it was unsanitary unless the Board of Health were prepared to provide a place for them. Dr. Tanton left the matter for the Board to deal with.

It was agreed that it was not the duty of the Board of Health to pass a by-law for the compulsory placing of water in houses but that it was a matter for the Water and Sewerage Committee to deal with and a motion was passed to refer the matter to them and to ask them to report on it in the near future.

Mr. Bishop stated that the cost of having water in the house was about seven dollars a year. Many people, who could well afford to have water were loathe to have it put in and yet in many instances had the benefits of the Town water in case of fire.

Another matter which came up for discussion was a complaint regarding the granting of plumbing licenses to unqualified men. As the hour was late and the matter considered an important one it was adjourned. A meeting to be held at the call of the Mayor.—S.

Unsanitary Conditions Discussed At Meeting S'Side Board Of Trade

The Summerside Board of Health met on Friday evening to discuss the unsanitary conditions prevailing in different sections of the town and of which complaints have been made to the Town Council and Board of Health. Dr. E. T. Tanton, Health Officer was present; also Mr. Thomas Bishop, representing the Water and Sewerage Committee. All the councillors were present with Mayor Lidstone in the chair. Several citizens were present. Mr. Arsenault, Town Scavenger, reported that a certain place in one of the best residential parts of the town was in a very unsanitary condition and complaints had been made regarding this condition by people living nearby. Mr. Phillips considered that the matter should be looked into immediately as these conditions have been known to exist for some time. The opinion was expressed by several of the Board that when the water and sewerage is laid down a street that all the property holders on that street should be compelled to use it and that a by law to that effect should be made. The water was laid down on most of the streets in the east end of the town. Mr. Bishop said, but there were a good many citizens who did not take advantage of it. On the other hand citizens in the west end who desire to have the water laid on in their houses cannot have that privilege. Several citizens present complained of the existence of many houses in the best residential parts of the town without water or sewerage.

Dr. Tanton addressed the meeting and said that he had advised for many years that the keeping of animals within the town limits should be done away with, as the keeping of these pens is a menace to health. Also that every landlord should be compelled to put water into every house before he rented it to anyone. He considered that the only way the town could deal with these unsanitary conditions was to pass a by-law that would prohibit these conditions and then to see that it is carried out to the letter.
