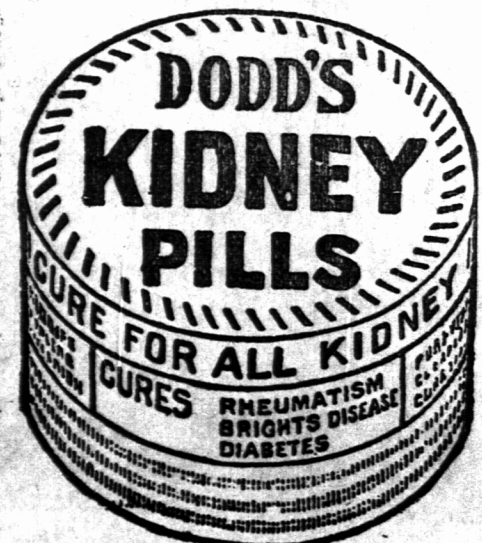

THE LEGISLATURE.

It cannot be said that the speech with which Governor Howlan yesterday opened the legislature is barren of important measures. The question of a bridge across the Hillsboro at this city is to be grappled with in a manner that will no doubt secure the construction of that important public work. It will be a decided advantage both to the city and the large and populous district beyond to have railway connection, and also a railway and general traffic bridge to replace the existing ferry.

Not less important is the promised measure by which the province will enter upon its newly recognised rights to the foreshores, bays and rivers and the fisheries therein. All that this means we do not realise as yet but there is a hint in the speech that the value will not be inconsiderable and will improve our financial position as a province. Such improvement is greatly needed, in view of the fact that our revenue has been far short of what our provincial needs require.

The appointment of dairy inspector, an amendment of the Road Act, and better provision for the construction of permanent public works are measures which, if properly shaped and guarded may be of important benefit. They will be further considered when we learn their full purport. As the date of meeting is unfortunately late in the season, we trust that the session may be devoted to earnest work without needless debate. Fair and full discussion is always right and useful, but representatives are sometimes tempted to speak too frequently and at too great length.

The Stanley may now be of little use for ice-breaking but she is still capable of Sabbath-breaking.

"A bean in darkness let it grow." All our readers who noted the improvement on Tennyson in THE GUARDIAN of yesterday, would of course know that it was intended as a test for the Patriot editor—just to see "whether he knew beans," so to speak.

We are not indebted to the Stanley this year for opening the navigation to and from this port. That honor belongs to the Steam Navigation Company's good steamship Princess. She broke out yesterday before the Stanley broke in. We had occasion to celebrate the good work of the Stanley last year in forcing her way to this port at an unusually early date in the spring. We conclude that our old winter steamer is no longer equal to her work, and it is evidently high time that a second and stronger ice-breaker was placed in our winter service as is to be done next fall.

In the extract from the speech of Mr. McDonald of Kings which we reproduce it may be noted that he speaks of THE GUARDIAN as a supporter of the Laurier government. This is misleading, though no doubt Mr. McDonald thought it would strengthen the case he was making against the Scrimgeour warehouse. Our readers know quite well that THE GUARDIAN is entirely independent of all governments and equally free and unfettered to commend their measures and policy when we think they are right; and to condemn them when wrong. It will be seen that the wrong in this case has been brought home to the Ottawa ministers very plainly and clearly in the Commons. It remains to be seen whether they will make it right. They may rest assured that if the warehouse is continued the matter will be kept before the public.

His Honor, Lieut. Governor Howlan has kindly called our attention to the fact that there is a great development of the beet sugar industry in the state of Michigan, which is situated between 42 and 47 north latitude, corresponding with the latitude of the maritime provinces. Eight new factories will be put in operation this fall, each with a capacity to handle from 350 to 500 tons of beets daily, or an aggregate of 3,400 tons daily in all. These are big figures. So great has been the success of the experiment that Michigan farmers are going into the beet sugar business in this wholesale way. There is apparently no doubt that the sugar beet can be grown successfully in large quantities in P. E. Island. To carry on the business would require the co-operation of a large number of growers, but our farmers have already learned to work together in the cheese and butter industry and could therefore the more readily enter upon the production of beet sugar.

A young man named Frank Murphy, belonging to Emvayle, Lot 30, was early yesterday morning arrested at his father's house by sergeant Bradley, officer Campbell and Constable William Taylor, on a charge of forgery. When sergeant Bradley made the arrest he said to Murphy, "Do you know what this is for?" Murphy's reply was "I suppose so," and upon Bradley offering to tell him if he guessed right he said, "For Alfred McEachen." Murphy was arraigned before stipendiary Haszard and several witnesses were examined. The evidence showed that on Saturday, Murphy entered the shoe shop of Mr. A. E. McEachen, on Queen Street, and bought a pair of boots and a small valise. In payment he tendered a check for \$12 made payable to James Murray, and to which the signature of Benj. Heartz was affixed. Mr. McEachen did not wish to cash the check, but did so upon the assurance of Murphy that he was the James Murray to whom it was made payable and that he was employed on Mr. Heartz's farm, giving the difference between the cost of the goods and the amount of the check in cash. He subsequently discovered that the check was forged and reported the matter to the police. It was also shown that on the 7th Murphy passed checks on Prowse Bros. and Goff Bros. To both of these checks the name of P. P. Archibald was attached, and each was made payable to James

McDonald an employe of Mr. Archibald The check cashed by Prowse Bros. was for \$12, and he got the amount in cash. The check cashed at Goff Bros. was for \$16 and he got the amount in full, less the price of a pair of boots. Previous to going to Goff Bros. Murphy tried to have the check cashed at Week & Co's., but failed. Another charge of forgery preferred against Murphy is to be investigated next Monday, to which date Murphy has been remanded to jail. This is a charge of passing a check for \$17 upon W. E. Dawson, to which the name of M. P. Hogan was attached. Upon this check goods to the value of \$4 and the balance in cash were obtained. Mr. McEachen positively identified Murphy as the man who passed the check upon him. He has also been identified as the person who passed the check at Dawson's store. Mr. L. E. Prowse said he believed him to be the one who had the check cashed in their store. Mr. Webster could not identify him as the one who cashed the check at Goff Bros.
