SUMMER VISITORS.

We need an active, energetic tourist association such as exists in some of the States and the Mainland Provinces of Canada. It is too late to make such an organization effective for this year, but we may, and probably will profit by the efforts that are put forth in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to attract visitors to their shores. Many of the tourists having come so far will desire to see what the Island is like. Others who have already tested the Island's fitness as a summer resort will this year come again. And the trouble will be that during a part of the month of July the existing accommodation will be overtaxed or found insufficient.

When once it happens that a number of tourists are unable to find accommodation—or what is pretty much the same thing, failed to find the kind of accommodation they want—and are turned back, a great injury is inflicted upon the tourist business for the season, if not longer. They spread the word that "It is no use to go to the Island, for many have been turned back already." We yet want hotel room for those who are willing to pay high prices for what in the States is known as first-class accommodation, but who are the last people in the world to pay big prices unless they can get what they want. This class will continue to go elsewhere until provision is made for their reception and comfort such as they require.

Apart from the very wealthy class there are numerous persons and families of the middle classes of the inland Provinces and the States who desire an outing, change of climate, food and scene during the heated term. Very many of these, especially family parties, or parties of women and children would prefer a farm house to an hotel during their stay abroad. For this class large preparations are made every year in the farm houses of the state of Maine, to the mutual advantage of the tourists and their hosts. This class of tourists do not expect to pay fancy prices. They want quiet, rest, the cool, free country air, good, plain, well cooked country food, and fair sleeping accommodations. The seashore, the grove, the bicycle, the fishing rod and the camera supply employment. For this class of summer visitors we have scarcely at all catered, and yet it is a trade which in Maine brings to the rural population an income that is reckoned not in hundreds of thousands, but in millions in a single season. In many cases the same visitors return from year to year and a strong bond of friendship springs up in the basis of what was at first a purely business arrangement. Our Island farmers have not yet as a class awakened to the advantages of the summer boarders idea. Hence it is that our accommodation for tourists, being strictly limited to the mere hotel capacity of the Island, results in some being turned back after they come, and in many being prevented from coming.

If a farmer desires to take in summer boarders he should make some needful preparations, and then let the fact be known so that the coming tourists may find him out. A few lines in the advertising columns of THE GUARDIAN would acquaint those who are seeking a home in a farm house with a place where such a home may be found, the number who can accommodate, whether near the sea-shore or otherwise, and the special attractions, if any. When this idea is developed we shall have ten summer visitors where heretofore we have had one, and many

farmers will have gained handsomely by marketing their food-stuffs at home at good prices, besides receiving a fair rental for the spare rooms in the spacious farmhouse.
